

# Longer Extension of Life Seen by Professor MacNider

There has been "such a tremendous increase in the life expectancy of man in the last quarter of a century that many persons between the ages of 60 and 75 who would have been dead under conditions prevailing a century ago are now alive and active," Dr. W. deB. MacNider, Kenan Research Professor of Pharmacology in the University, said here recently in announcing the establishment of a national magazine to be devoted exclusively to a study of the ageing process.

"We feel that it is extremely important to find out all we can about the life processes of ageing individuals, in the hope that we may learn how to keep people well and active and happy as long as they live instead of letting them become victims of the usual diseases of old age," Dr. MacNider said.

The journal is in response to a tremendous increase in scientific and lay interest in the ageing process, Dr. MacNider explained. With the enormous decrease in the mortality of young children and the new discoveries in medicine, such as the sulfa

drugs, there is reason to hope the life span, which already has been prolonged in the last 25 years, may be extended much further, he said.

Dr. MacNider has been devoting much time in recent years to the study of the ageing process. For the last eight years he has served as Chairman of the American Division of the International Club for Research on Ageing, and last year he served as first president of the National Gerontological Society, established only a year ago.

It was during Dr. MacNider's administration that plans were made for starting the new magazine which is to be called "The Journal of Gerontology" and which is to be the official organ of the Gerontological Society. It is to be published four times a year.

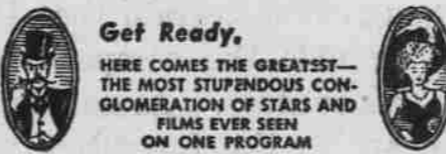

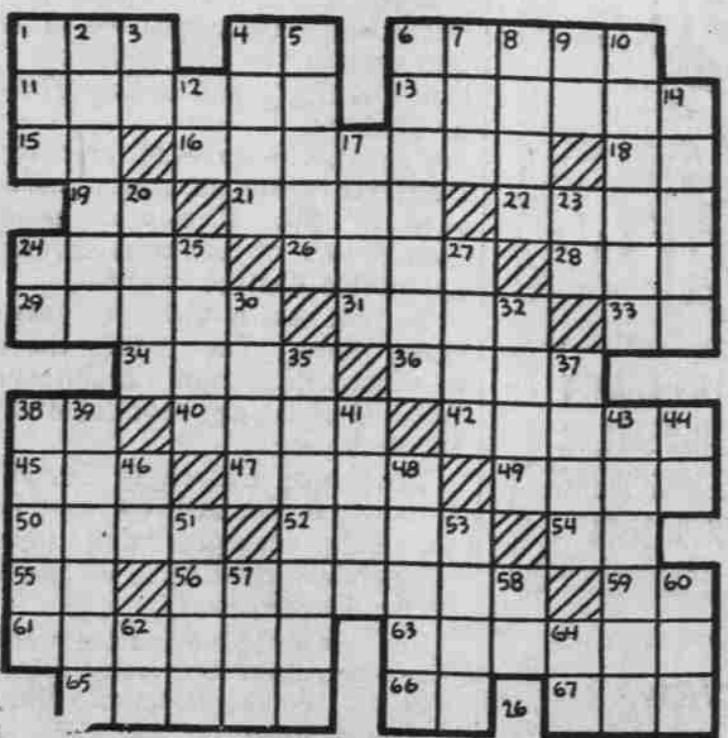
