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Law School to Limit Veterans' Eligibility For Summer Session

In another school announcement today, the University of North Carolina Law School says that veterans applying for admission to its summer session cannot receive more than a year's credit for active service in the recent war.

School officials also said that students entering the Law school for the first time must have at least a C average for the required minimum of three years of accredited college work in order to qualify for admission.

Applications for entrance to the Law school will be accepted for beginning law students and transfer students until May 1st.

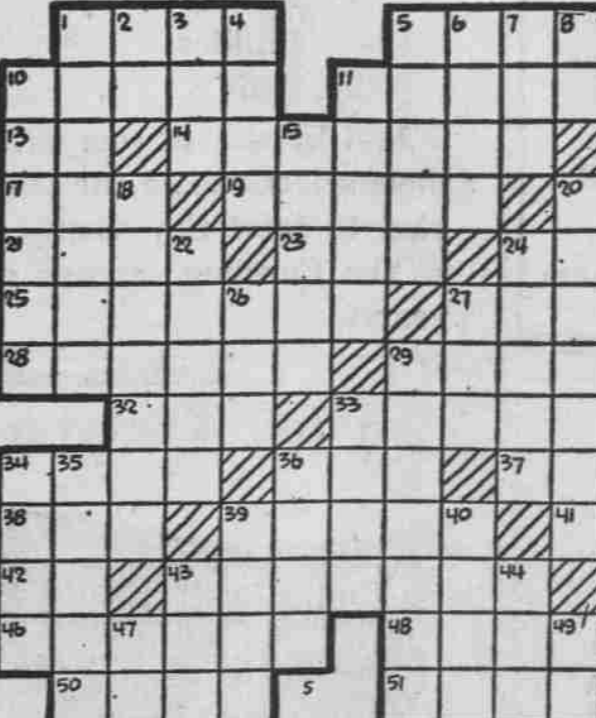
The constitution, as it now stands, is ready to be rediscussed. Many disputed amendments will be again be put on the floor.
