Chinese Communists Penetrate Changchun

Chungking, April 17-The latest dispatches from Manchuria report that a communist army has penetrated the capital city of Changchun. And the outnumbered nationalist defenders are surrounded but still holding out in a small corner of the city. American Envoy General George C. Marshall has arrived in Peiping and has scheduled immediate conferences with nationalist and communist leaders.
