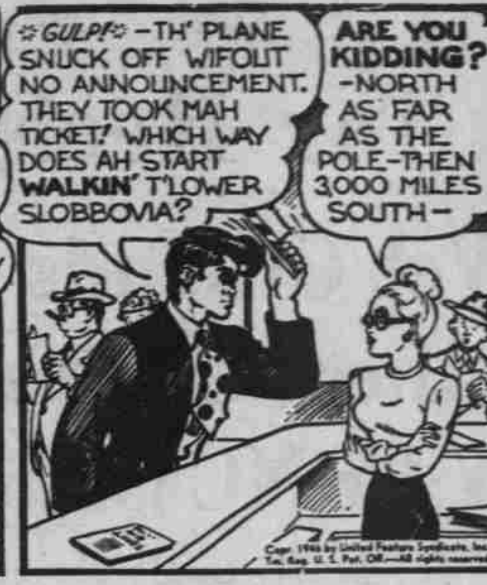
Government Charges Sherman Act Abused
