Washington, April 19—The government says it has shattered a multi-million dollar racket in used cars in a drive to break up the biggest black market in OPA history. An eight-months probe has ended with the naming of 31 persons. They are charged with arranging for the purchase of cars in Detroit and selling them in the southern United States.

## Spain Makes Charges Against Red Freight

New York, April 19—The Spanish government is reported tonight to have charged that a Russian freighter has landed 15 thousand tons of ammunition at Marseilles for the use of Communist forces planning an attack against Spain from France. The charges are said to have been made in a note sent to our government.

## Russian Lieutenant Denies Espionage

Washington, April 19—The Russian Naval Officer charged with espionage again has protested his innocence. Lieutenant Nicolai Gregorovich Redin, accused of having obtained secrets

of the Destroyer Tender USS Yellowstone while in Seattle, will be defined by two Portland, Oregon, attorneys. However, both lawyers maintain that, although the Russian government is paying the legal fees, they are defending Redin as an individual and not as a representative of Russia.

## Vet's Surplus Needs Truman's Signature

Washington, April 19—All that's needed now to give veterans first choice of surplus goods is the signature of President Truman. The Senate today passed House-approved legislation setting aside certain types of surplus government property for exclusive sale to ex-GI's.

## Australia's Proposal May Have Solution

New York, April 19—It looks tonight as if Australia's proposal for a five-man subcommittee investigation of the Franco government may solve the United Nations Security Council dispute over Spain. Both the United States and Great Britain are said to favor the Australian proposal. Even Poland, apparently reconciled to the certain defeat of her demand for a U-N diplomatic break with Spain, is said to be considering the Australian suggestion.

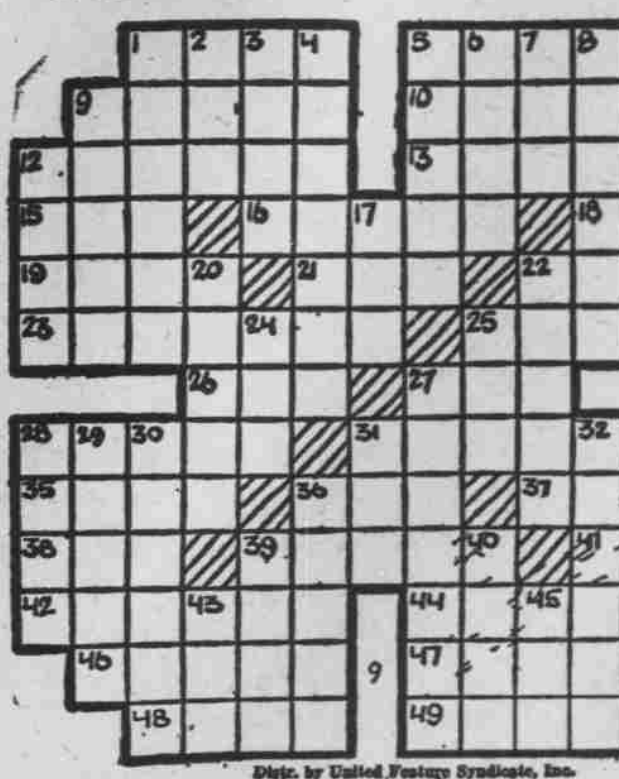
