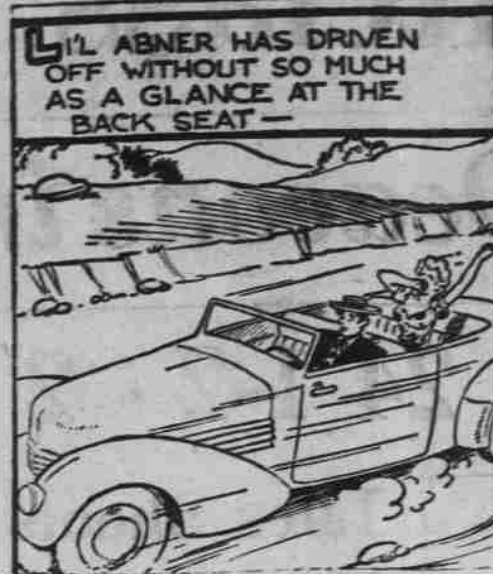

Berkeley, Calif., April 30.—Dr. Ernest Orland Lawrence, Nobel Prize winner whose laboratory achievements contributed greatly to development of the atomic bomb, tonight announced the invention of the synchrotron, a powerful new type of atom smasher that may revolutionize research in nuclear fission.
