Student Union Will Sponsor Results Party

All Voting Slated For Gerrard Hall

Carolina's first peace-time spring elections in five years will be climaxed today when members of the student body cast their ballots in Gerrard Hall to elect campus leaders for next year.

With seven men running for student body president and five for Daily Tar Heel editor, a run-

off election is expected to be conducted either the last of this week or the first of next week.

The only ballot box will be located in Gerrard hall. Votes may be cast from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Four different check-off lines will speed up the procedure, according to Fred Bauder, Elections Committee chairman. Women living in town, women living in dormitories, men living in town, and men living in dormitories will receive ballots and be checked off in separate lines.

Bauder announced that there would be no campaigning or campaign literature allowed in or on Gerrard hall. The voting will be well monitored, he said.

"The campaigning so far has been fine," the chairman stated, "There have been no violations and we hope there will be none today."

Positions to be filled in the annual election include president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer of the student body. Editors of the Daily Tar Heel, Carolina Mag, and Yackety Yack are to be chosen, as well as members of the Publications Union board.

Head cheerleaders, president and vice-president of Carolina Athletic Association, members of legislature, student council, and men's and women's councils are also to be chosen.
