Lennox Robinson, visiting lecturer in the dramatic art department, will direct the coming Carolina Playmakers' production of his play, "Drama at Inish," a light Irish comedy, to be presented in the Playmakers theatre December 4, 5, 6 and 7 at 8:30 o'clock.

"Drama at Inish" tells the comic story of what happens to the people in the peaceful town of Inish when a troupe of crusading actors arrived to bring "naturalism" to an audience that is used to enjoying the circus. All of the colleges and universities in the state have been sent invitations to the session and each school was assigned a definite quota of delegates.

On this campus the Di senate, Phi assembly and other organizations will be given a chance to suggest possible delegates to the assembly. However, the Debate council will have final jurisdiction as to who will be selected to attend. As in the past the delegates selected will represent officially not the University or the Debate council, but their own interests.

Before attending the session next month the delegates will hold several meetings to decide what bills the Carolina delegation will sponsor and other proposals for which they will lobby.

Lapsed NSLI Policies Should Be Reinstated By January 31, 1947

Student veterans whose National Service Life Insurance has elapsed were warned yesterday by Veterans' Adviser F. Carlyle Shepard that they must apply for reinstatement before January 31, 1947, if they wish to obtain the reissued policy without a physical examination.

After the January 31 deadline a physical examination will be required of each man who wishes reinstatement. Until January 31 a man may renew his policy by filling out a blank which can be obtained at the veterans' office, 221 South Building.

"Recent legislation has increased the benefits which the veteran may obtain under National Service Life Insurance," Shepard said. A new twenty-year endowment policy which may be collected either at the age of 60 or 65 has been added to benefits.

the remaining 20 months of his brother's term. In 1942 he was re-elected to the House of Representatives and during the primaries of last spring he ran against and defeated Thurmond Chatham, industrialist tycoon from Elkin, after a special run off.

At the present nothing is known of his future plans concerning his political career, however, it is rumored that he will not run again for re-election, but will support some other candidate who will in all probability run against Chatham.
