

Political Year Starts Rolling With Two Meetings Monday

CP to Hold Forth In Student Union

Campus Party members, old and new, will have the opportunity to meet each other at a welcoming meeting for new students and freshmen to be held in Horace Williams Lounge of Graham Memorial tomorrow night at 7:30. CP Chairman Vestal Taylor said yesterday.

"We want the students who are undecided as to which party to join to choose CP, for we have

what they want: complete freedom of political expression," Taylor stated, firing the first gun of the next campus political campaign.

"I feel we offer the broadest avenue of personal expression views of any party on campus," he went on. "Since we are neither dogmatically fraternity nor anti-fraternity, though we are opposed to the fraternity bloc, we offer a middle of the road course to all new students and incoming freshmen who feel that they have a gift or a need for political expression or activities."

Rally in Gerrard Scheduled by SP

Student Party Chairman Fred Thompson revealed yesterday that the Student Party political rally, to be held in Gerrard Hall tomorrow night at 8 o'clock will feature talks by Student Body President Bill Mackie; Chuck Hauser, managing editor of The Daily Tar Heel, and Orientation Chairman Al Lowenstein.

According to Thompson, "Monday night's rally is being organized for the benefit of new students and the Student Party outlook on self-government at Carolina will be presented."

First speaker at the rally will be newsman Chuck Hauser who will give an analysis of the campus political scene. During last spring's nominations, Hauser was endorsed for the editorship of The Daily Tar Heel by all three parties but later declined the office for academic reasons.

Al Lowenstein, longtime leader in the S. P., whom political foes have accused of being the "boss" of the S. P., will discuss the "history and philosophy of the Student Party."

Lowenstein was one of the writers of the student constitution. In his race for the vice-presidency last May, he lost by 22 votes.

Recent Student Party accomplishments and plans of the S. P. administration for this year will be the topic of President Mackie's speech.

An open business meeting for the purpose of recommending replacements for three vacancies in Student Government has been called by Thompson following the talks.
