UNC State Student Solons Will Be Chosen This Week

University Has 23 Vote Members In Raleigh Meet

The Carolina delegation to this year's session of the State Student Legislature will be chosen following interviews of all interested students in the Carolina Forum office in Graham Memorial from 3 until 6 o'clock tomorrow and Thursday.

John Sanders, UNC representative to the Legislature Interim Council, said yesterday the special selection board, set up to pick the delegates, is anxious to have a large number of applicants.

According to Sanders, the Board will make every effort to select a delegation representative of all elements of the student body. "We want students who are interested in state and national problems especially those with some parliamentary experience," he said.

The Board is composed of Sanders, Banks Talley, Secretary-Treasurer of the Interim Council, Herschel Keener of the Debate Council, Art Murphy, President of the Di Senate, and Graham Jones, Speaker of the Phi Assembly.

The State Student Legislature is patterned after the North Carolina General Assembly. Every college in the state is allowed to send four senators. Representatives are apportioned on a basis of enrollment. Carolina, with 19 representatives and four senators, will have the largest delegation at the Legislature.

game. "It was a little wetter than we wanted it to be, but that was no fault of mine," Tinsley said. "If the field was so wet, how come none of the UNC backs slipped and how come they completed 14 out of 22 passes and Justice averaged about 46 yards a punt? Our jerseys weren't even muddied."

Tinsley said the field was watered twice around the middle through a mixup, but that most of it hadn't been wet since Friday night.

"Our dry weather routine," he explained, "calls for an attendant to sprinkle the field after our boys, the visiting team and the band have practiced Friday night. Ordinarily, the visiting team gets through by 8:30 but North Carolina didn't finish until 9:30."

"By then the attendant had gone home and one of our team managers sprinkled the field. Then Saturday morning when I got to the stadium I saw the attendant wetting down around midfield and I stopped him. He hadn't known it had already been watered."

Then he added: "Not one of the 45,000 people who saw the game will tell you there was any water out there. Only in about four spots in the middle was it damp at all."

"It wasn't the field that stopped Justice. It was our line and Roshto and Hedges."

North Carolina's great Charlie Justice was unable to sweep down the sidelines, his specialty. Linebackers Jimmy Roshto and Lee Hedges kept him boxed into the LSU line during the game, holding him to a net gain of 48 yards rushing in about a dozen attempts.

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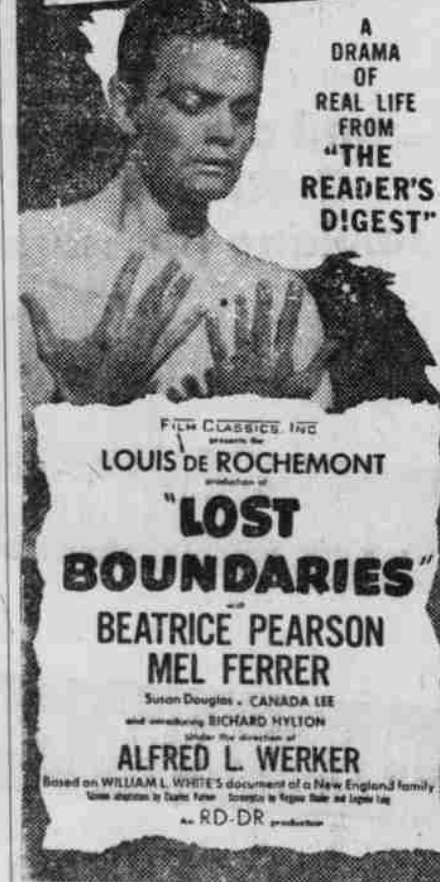
