

Cotton Bowl Trip Marks Third Excursion In Four Years

UNC Gridders Will Attempt Initial Post-Season Win

For the third time in four years, the gridiron warriors of Chapel Hill will make a New Year trek to a major bowl game. The contest this time calls for the Tar Heels to defend the prestige of the Southern Conference against the Rice Owls, champions of the wide-open Southwest.

But for the first time the Tar Heels will find themselves in the Cotton Bowl and their bowl opponent will be a team from the "pass 'em to death" neck of the woods. With talented Tobin Rote to engineer the attack for Rice, it all adds up to a rather large assignment for the locals.

The contest on January 2 will mark the last appearance in the Blue and White for the two most famous gridders ever to run on green turf of Kenan Stadium, All-America combination of Charlie Justice and Art Weiner. Eleven other Tar Heel seniors will close out their grid careers for the old school next month.

As for the opposition the Tar Heels will be in for one of their roughest afternoons of the year. Rice, winner of nine out of ten games, during their successful quest for the SWC title, defeated some outstanding teams including Texas, SMU, Baylor, Arkansas, TCU and Clemson. The only loss for the Owls was to LSU, 14-7.

In quarterback Rote, Rice has one of the more outstanding players in the Southwest. Some sportswriters are of the opinion that he is a better all-round ball player than his famous cousin, Kyle of SMU.

Although the Tar Heels dropped three games this year, they suffered quite a few injuries following the LSU fiasco and consequently fell before the onslaughts of Tennessee and Notre Dame by larger scores than expected. Against the Irish, the nation's top club, Carolina turned in a great battle and the 42-6 score was in no way indicative of the battle Carolina put up.

In past bowl experiences the Tar Heels have not fared well. In 1947 Georgia bounced Carolina, 20-10, in a Sugar Bowl game in which the officiating was very questionable. This past January the Tar Heels returned to New Orleans where they bowed to Oklahoma's powerful squad, 14-6. Rice, on the other hand, has never dropped a post-season affair. The Owls first appeared in a bowl in 1938 when they played host to Colorado and whipped the western club, 28-14, in the Cotton Bowl. In 1947 the Rice club defeated Tennessee, 8-0, in Miami's Orange Bowl.

Jess Neely, the Rice coach, also has the distinction of never having lost a bowl game. Neely got his introduction to the post-season affairs in 1940 when his Clemson team tripped Boston College, 6-3. Neely was then hired by Rice and was the Owls' head mentor when they whipped Tennessee.

Carolina's Big Blue has this week off from practice, but the squad will report for work again on Monday. The team will work until a few days before Christmas and then practice will be suspended for the holidays. The team will reassemble here and leave for Dallas probably on December 27.

Frat Wrestling Underway; Starts Wed. in Dorm Div.

In line with its policy of keeping things popping down at Woolen Gym, the Intramural department has underway at present a very successful Fall wrestling program.

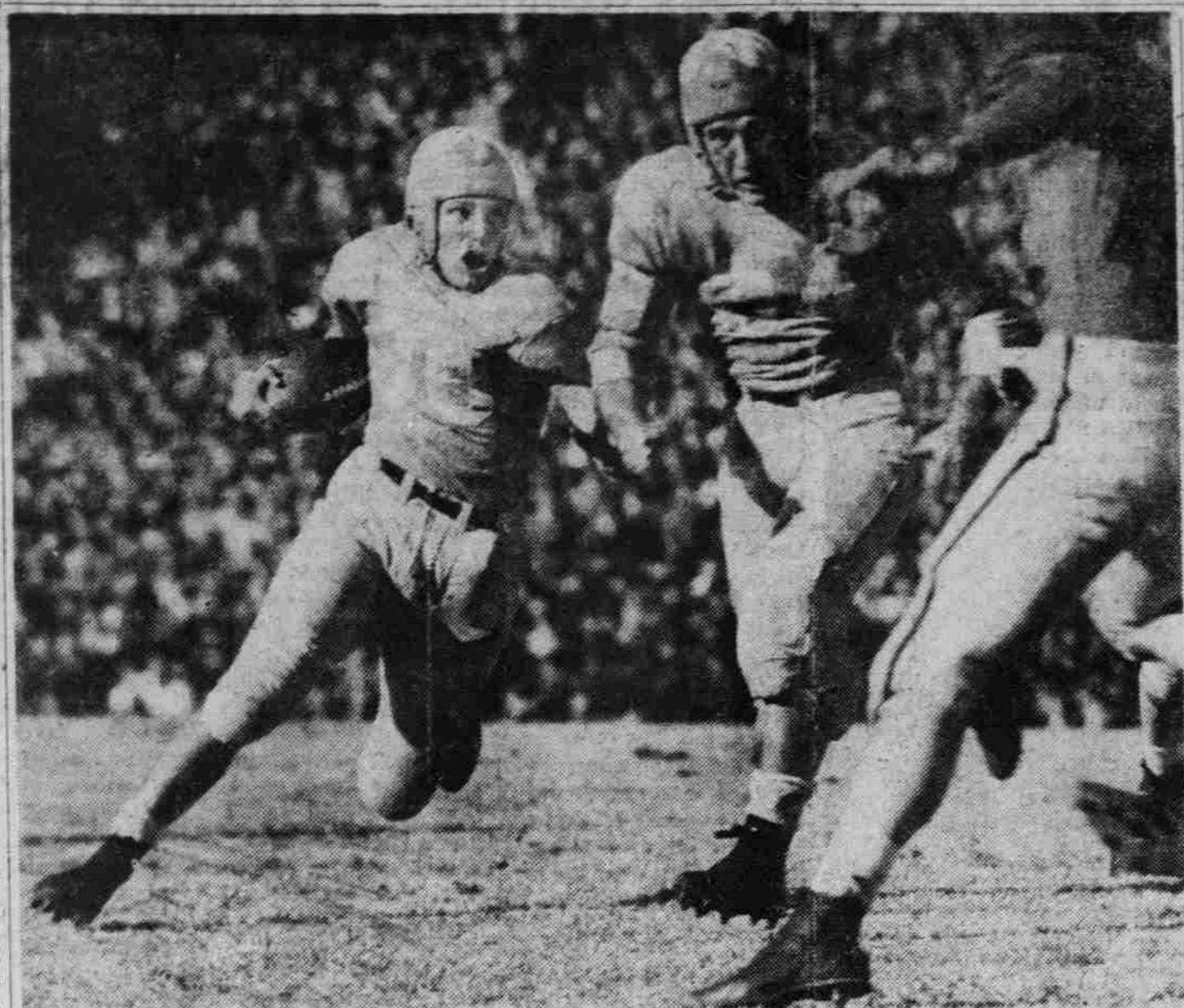

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Terps, Missouri Picked to Play In Gator Bowl

NEW YORK, Nov. 28—(AP)—The University of Missouri will oppose Maryland in the Gator Bowl football game at Jacksonville, Fla., Jan. 2, it was announced tonight by the Mutual Broadcasting System. MBS said it will broadcast the game over a coast to coast network.

Maryland's acceptance of an invitation to the game was announced early in the day by the bowl's selection chairman, J. B. Darby.

MBS announced that three-beaten Missouri was to be the once-beaten Terrapins' foe. Maryland, fielding one of its finest teams in years, has won seven of its eight games. The Terrapins lost only to Michigan State, 14-7. Maryland still has one game to go on its regular schedule, against Miami of Florida this Friday night.

Missouri won seven games and lost three, two of the defeats coming by one point margins. The Tigers lost their first game to Ohio State, the Big Ten's Rose Bowl nominee, 35-34, and their second to Southern Methodist, 28-27. Their other defeat was to all-conquering Oklahoma, the Sugar Bowl team, 27-7.

Missouri beat Oklahoma A&M, Illinois, Iowa State, Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas and Kansas State.

Four Tar Heels All-State; Ten Others Receive Mention

RALEIGH, Nov. 28—(AP)—North Carolina's Cotton Bowl-bound Tar Heels today placed four players on the Associated Press All-State, college grid team. Three of the four Tar Heels won their places on the mythical eleven by unanimous votes. They were: end Art Weiner, center Irv Holdash, and back Charlie Justice. The fourth North Carolina player on the first team was fullback Billy Hayes.

Three Wake Forest gridsters were voted on the first team. They were: end Red O'Quinn, guard Ray Cicia, and halfback Bill Gregus. Duke placed tackle Lousi Allen and halfback Billy Cox on the team, and N. C. State rounded out the eleven with tackle Elmer Costa and guard Charlie Musser. (See ALL-STATE, page 6)
