(Continued from page 1) call for "the acceptance of the objectives for complete elimination of segregation" rather than the "moral obligation of ultimate elimination."

In the Senate, the toughest fight was over a bill submitted by Shaw University seeking consolidation of A and T College in Greensboro and North Carolina College in Durham into the Greater University of North Carolina.

The measure was defeated in the House after a minimum of debate, but the Senate recommitted it, apparently to die on the table. It was opposed by the delegations of both schools concerned.

Other legislation passed included a resolution favoring putting control of the state penal institutions in the hands of the Welfare Department, one favoring the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights, a bill creating an academy of scientists and one concerned with changes in inheritance laws.

Also passed was a bill favoring equalization of state school bus fleets, but it had to be sent to committee to iron out amendment differences.

A bill favoring re-establishment of the state automobile mechanical inspection program was recommended in both house for more working.

Included in tomorrow's agenda is a resolution supporting Governor Scott's "Go Forward" program, a bill to give the governor the veto power, and a bill asking the preparation of new election registration books in the state.
