Mrs. Arnold Nash will address a Y-sponsored discussion group tonight at 7:15 in the Baptist Church. She will speak on men-women relationships.

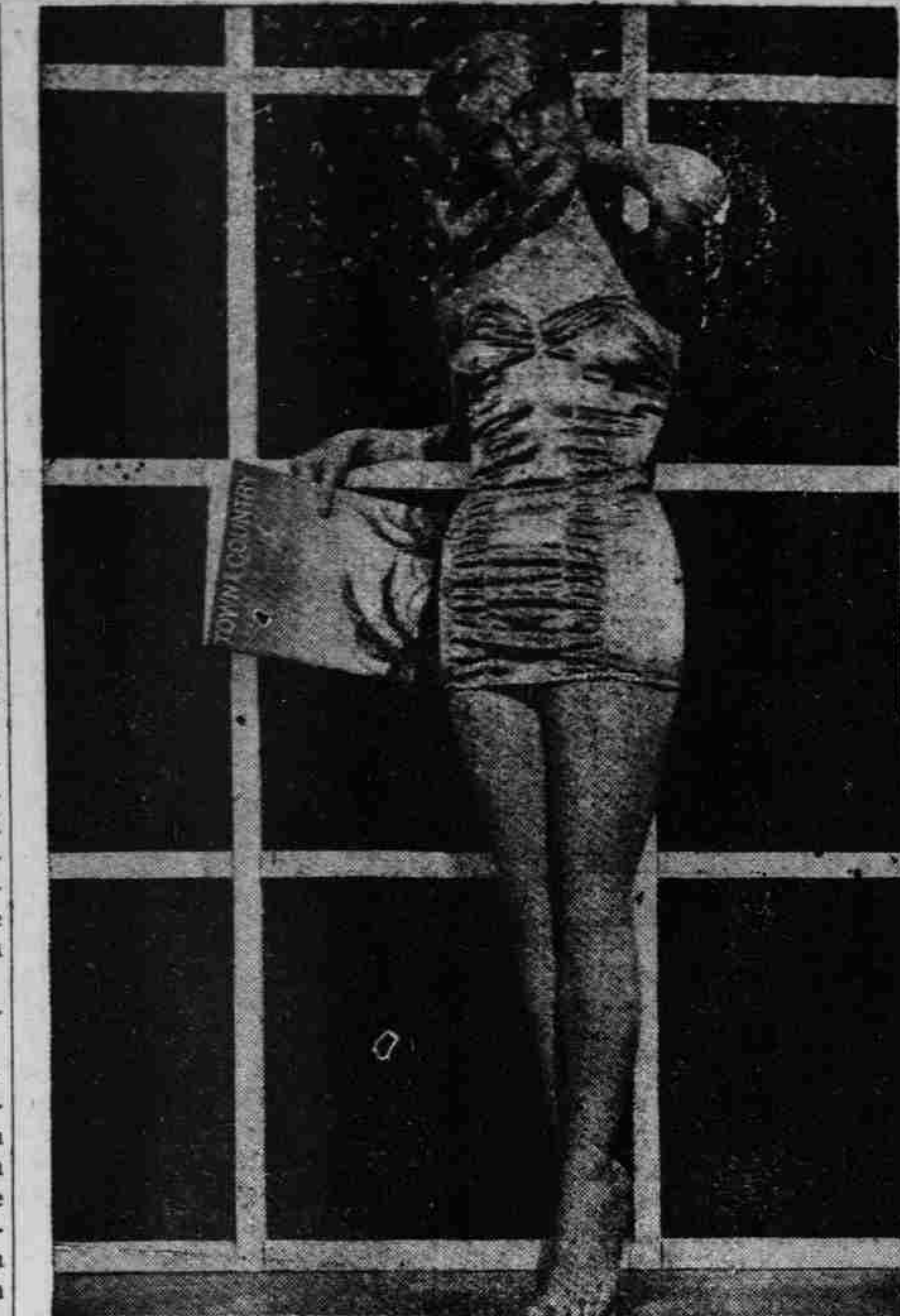
The Travel Agency will be closed today. Open again tomorrow.

# Kappa Alpha Convivum Hears Chief Counselor

"Make every day Robert E. Lee day!" was the challenge that Howard P. Locke, senior counselor of the Kappa Alpha Order, presented to the Upsilon chapter of the KA social fraternity here in an address at a recent banquet session in observance of Lee's birthday.

Locke, a native of Charleston, S. C., now connected with the Tax Division of the Department of Justice, was the main speaker for the annual commemoration that drew 90 fraternity members, alumni, and guests together this year to honor the Confederate general who served as the spiritual founder of Kappa Alphaism while president of Washington and Lee University in 1865.

The present campus fad throughout the South for converting the Confederate flag into a football pennant received strong condemnation from Locke. Deeming such frivolity a mistaken interpretation of the ideals that Lee exhibited in becoming a nationwide hero, Locke beseeched Kappa Alphas to lead young people to give the man, his cause, and his character more serious consideration.

"The claims and demands which are today asserted against our very life," Locke explained to the KA assemblage, "call upon us to measure what is right with the judgement of Lee; to approach a decision with the self-control of Lee; to treat impatient friend and heart-strong foe with the unforced courtesy of Lee; to chart our course and follow it with the conviction of Lee; and to wage our daily conflicts with the purpose of Lee."

Also present for this KA tribute to Robert E. Lee was Frank H. Myers, district court judge of Washington, D. C., former Kappa Alpha senior councillor, and past president of the National Interfraternity Council.

# Best Fashions Are Up Sleeves—Dior

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Your best fashion tricks are up your sleeve for spring, it was demonstrated today by two top designers, Christian Dior of Paris and Monte-Sano of New York, during a week crowded with style previews.

Dior, in his American wholesale collection, stresses the rounded silhouette, with all fullness above the belt and with skirts for the most part short, straight and tight. But it is in his sleeve tricks that the designer lets himself go. These are bloused, shirred, cut in melon, flower or lantern shapes, sometimes cuffed just below the elbow, always full of interest.

The Frenchman, now trying to live down his reputation as father of the "new look," continues the bloused silhouette on tightly belted jackets above peg-top skirts that taper toward the hem. His evening gowns are strictly fabulous, and here he may use 20 yards of fabric in a single skirt, just to make up for the skimping on daytime skirts.

Monte-Sano, famous for coats and suits, also goes in for fanciful sleeves this season, one of which is the "tulip" sleeve, flaring above the elbow, stopping just below. Another is the wrapped "envelope" sleeve, and another the wraparound.

He shows a series of "little coats with big sleeves." Shows "little overcoats" and princess greatcoats in luscious vivid and pastel colors of soft fleece. This designer likes sailor collars on both coats and suits, shows one "middy blouse" coat dress with sailor collar, hip band and pleated skirt. Other coats have huge "handkerchief" collars which hang over the shoulders on both sides.

His brief satin or fleece evening capes and coats are small master-pieces designed to dramatize even a wallflower.
