1950 Parisian Dress Styles Need Good Foundations

PARIS, February 17—Parisian couturiers agreed today that proper foundations are essential for the new 1950 Paris Spring styles. Innovations are evident in nearly all the new dresses and gowns. The accent in general is on soft, rounded, natural and youthful lines in contrast to last year's so-called "boyish look."

To show this line, good foundations are more important than ever. There must be no distortions, no super-narrow waists, no unnaturally pointed bosoms.

Collars are less high and less important than last season. Many models do not have any collars at all—for example Dior's bathing suit necks. By this fact the bust is more in evidence as an eye-catcher. Therefore brassieres gain importance and are the necessary basis for the youthfully rounded bosom.

The same counts for this year's fashion of sleeveless dresses. The bodice and with it the bust gain in importance.

As there is practically no shoulder padding in the new dresses or suits which would help to create a favorable bustline, all the bust-modeling is left to the brassiere. Breast pockets are rare, so women can not cheat with that detail. Dior's molding, sweater-like bodices bring the bust into evidence.

Pockets on skirts are often low. Dior shows very low, large patch-pockets which instead of hiding the hips, shows them up.

Bathing Suits Are Designed As Sex Trap
