that, if elected, he will base the amount of cheering on the desires of the students. He said that one of the big questions in his

mind is the cheering at basketball games. "I am in favor of cheering at the games," Jones said, "but it will be up to the team and the students as to whether we cheer or not, and if so, to what extent."

In describing the type of cheer-

ing he wants, Jones said he wanted a "unique, rhythmic beat for the Carolina yell. We will revive a few of the old cheers," he continued, "and add a number of new ones with this idea in mind."

Chambliss promised to work in close connection with the card-board, if elected, and revealed a plan which calls for the use of reversible blue and white hats to be used by the students to form words and numbers along with the card stunts. He also plans to give a large amount of publicity to the pep rallies, parades and demonstrations, and to keep the cheerleaders operative throughout the year.

In connection with the card stunts, Jones said that "particular stress will be put on the animated stunts," adding that "timely themes will be used at every game." He also emphasized the fact that he wants to work very closely with the University Club in order to promote better school spirit and to drum up more interest in minor sports. "Along this line," Jones stated, "I will work to have more and better parades at out-of-town games to let the peoples know that Carolina is around. I also want to lend a holiday atmosphere to home-game weekends."

In ending his statement of platform, Jones said that he wants to see the job of cheerleaders extended more fully with them acting as hosts to visiting teams. He concluded by saying that, if elected, he will have his cheerleaders "strive particularly to give visitors a true and lasting impression of the Carolina spirit, and will take the old college try with us when the team plays away from home."
