ate speakership. Davis led in a three-way fight Tuesday, with Dodie Boyer the eliminated candidate.

The total vote in last Tuesday's election was 2,894 and if last year's trend is followed today's vote should fall off approximately 10 percent.

Elections Board Chairman Jim Gwynn said yesterday that all laws governing the regular election apply in today's runoff.

Students will be required to show LD cards before voting at the 12 district polling places.

Polling places, districts and their boundaries include:

Men's Dorm District 1 consists of all residents of Stacey, Aycock, Lewis and Everett. Vote in Ay-

cock.  
Men's Dorm District 2 includes Manley, Mangum, Grimes, Ruffin, Emerson Field House and C Dorm. Vote in Mangum.

Men's Dorm District 3 includes Alexander, A and B Dorms, and Quonset Huts. Vote in Alexander.

Men's Dorm District 4 includes Steele, Old East Old West, B-V-P and B-V-P Trailer Court. Vote in Memorial Hall.

Men's Dorm District 5 includes Miller, Whitehead and Nash. Vote in Whitehead.

Men's Town District 1 includes Victory Village, Pittsboro Trailer Camp and areas through Victory Village. Vote in Memorial Hall or in Service Building No. 1.

Men's Town District 2 includes all student living in the southeastern section of Chapel Hill bounded by South Columbia Street up to the Carolina Inn, then straight out West Cameron

Avenue. All fraternity houses facing on Cameron will be included. Vote in Memorial Hall.  
Men's Town District 3 includes all student living in northwest section of Chapel Hill to north of Cameron and west of Old Fraternity Row with the exception of those living north of Franklin Street and east of North Columbia Street. Students living in Greensboro, Carboro, Durham and Hillsboro vote in Memorial Hall.

Women's Dorm District 1 includes residents of McIver, Alderman.

Women's Dorm District 2 includes residents of Spencer, Carr, and Smith. Vote in Memorial Hall except for Spencer, which votes in Alderman.

All women living in town will vote in Memorial Hall.

**Holiday Victim**

University graduate Neil A. Nelson, 24, was one of 23 North Carolinians who lost their lives in Easter weekend violence.

Nelson, a graduate in commerce last spring, was found dead in his overturned auto between Rocky Mount and Leggett Sunday morning.

He was employed as an insurance agent with a Raleigh firm. At the University he was a member of the Sigma Nu fraternity.

Patrolmen reported that they did not know what caused Nelson to run off the road. The victim was dead when officers arrived.

Some 10 names were presented to the Assembly by the Di-Phi Committee. The field of candidates for the award was finally narrowed down to three, including John Motley Morehead, Supreme Court Justice Sam Erwin, and U. S. Controller Lindsay Warren.

A unique situation in which three Phi Speakers locked horns in their three-way battle developed. John Giles, who headed the Phi in 1947, strongly advocated the candidacy of Justice Erwin, while former Speaker Herman Sieber defended his nominee, John Motley Morehead.

certain types of stars and star systems, or, finally, on the decay of radioactive atomic nuclei." It was Dr. Weizsacker who first proposed a detailed system of nuclear reactions to account for the source of energy in the sun and stars.

Tomorrow afternoon Dr. Weizsacker is to speak at a mathematics seminar here on "The Role of the Pythagorean Theorem in the Conceptual Structure of Physics." Tomorrow night he will address a Carolina-Duke Colloquium on "The Evolution of Stars and Galaxies" at Duke University.

Dr. Weizsacker has been at the University of Chicago for six months where he is the Alexander White Visiting Professor, lecturing on the philosophy of science and physics. His book, "The World View of Physics" was published by the University of Chicago Press this year.

Graham Jones, was finally sent to the joint Di-Phi Award Committee for approval.

Since the Dialectic Senate almost unanimously approved John Motley Morehead for the award which goes to "an outstanding alumnus who has distinguished himself in his field of endeavor," a joint session of the two debating societies will probably be held in the near future to make a choice between Morehead and Warren.

Included on tonight's business agenda is the election of a new treasurer for the Assembly. Treasurer-elect Walter Montgomery presented his resignation to Speaker Jones because of "laboratory conflicts."

**Health Meet Is Scheduled Next Week**

An Institute and Workshop on "The Role of Health Agencies in the Community Housing Program" will be conducted by the School of Public Health with the cooperation of the State Board of Health and Public Health Service of the Federal Security Agency here April 16, 17, 18.

The opening session will be a dinner at the Carolina Inn Sunday night at 6:30, with Dr. E. G. McGavran, Dean of the School of Public Health, presiding. Following a welcome by Chancellor R.B. House, there will be addresses by Dr. W. P. Dearing, Deputy Surgeon General, Public Health Service, and R. U. Ratcliff, Director, Division of Research, Housing and Home Finance Agency.

The principal speaker Monday will be M. A. Pond, Chief, Division of Engineering Resources, Public Health Service, who will give an address Monday morning, and Hugh R. Pomeroy, Director, Department of Planning of Westchester county, N. Y., a visiting lecturer this spring in the University's Department of City and Regional Planning, who will speak at a luncheon at 12:30.
