

Playmakers End Successful Tour

The tired and touring Carolina Playmakers returned to Chapel Hill like conquering heroes early Sunday morning after one of the most successful tours in Playmaker history.

The barnstorming Shakespearians gave 13 shows in 12 different towns in every part of the state, including a matinee and evening performance in Burlington. The strolling players reached the high point of their "Romeo and Juliet" performances when they concluded their 42nd tour at High Point Saturday night. The second half of their itinerary took them to Raleigh, Greenville, Asheboro, Fayetteville, Burlington, and High Point in that order.

As in the first half of their tour, everything happened from an alley cat walking across the stage during one of Juliet's more dramatic scenes to the bus breaking down three miles outside of Chapel Hill Friday night. But the climax came when the troupe gave two shows in the Burlington City Hall directly above the fire station. And it happened! Almost as though it were prearranged, a fire broke out right in the middle of each performance. Added to the chaos of sirens and roaring engines was a chorus of pigeons cooing contentedly in the alcoves of the auditorium.

At Asheboro, the Playmakers performed before their largest audience in many a day—1,500 enthusiastic patrons. At Fayetteville the actor's test came when it was all the local thespians could do to speak above the whistling and laughing and shouting of the crowd. The Shakespearians back in the Globe Theatre days couldn't have had undergone a more trying experience. The conglomeration of spectators from the pit returned to the Fayetteville audience that night in all their splendor.

Come the spring quarter and the Carolina Playmakers plan to take the Shakespearean tragedy on another tour. This time it will cover the Southeastern states, including South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Kentucky, and Tennessee.

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Air Officers Promoted

Lt. Col. Jesse J. Moorhead of the University Air ROTC unit yesterday announced the promotions of Captains Noel Carpenter and James R. Walker to the rank of major in the U. S. Air Force.

The new majors were both commissioned upon the completion of pilot training in 1942 and between them have logged over 5,000 flying hours in all types of aircraft from 65 horsepower liaison to 8,800 horsepower B-29's.

Both officers are assistant professors in the Air Science Department. Major Carpenter is the Executive officer and Major Walker is adjutant and supply officer of the ROTC detachment.

During the war Major Carpenter served in the Anti-Submarine Command, the Ferrying Command and the Air Transport Command while Major Walker was assigned as a B-29 Pilot in the operations against Japan from both the India-China and Pacific theaters.

At present they both are instructing in air comptrollership, Major Carpenter being in his second and Major Walker in his first year of duty at the University.

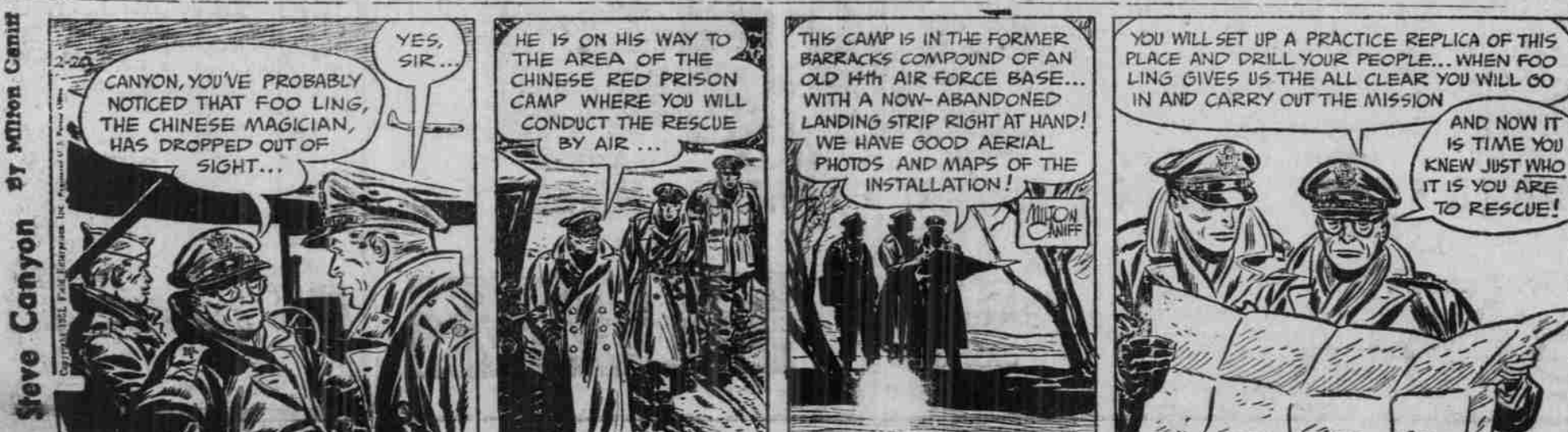
