

Modest Swede Head Man For Tennessee Harriers

Strong Vols Run Carolina Tomorrow

Alf Holmberg, one of the finest collegiate milers in the country and an assistant coach of the Tennessee cross-country team, comes to town with the powerful Vol harriers today, but he won't take any credit for their showing this year.

The Vols, who meet Carolina tomorrow at 10 a.m., will be favored to win, but Holmberg wouldn't have you believe he contributes much to their success. He described himself in a letter to this writer as "UT's import from Sweden; a miler who is no good in cross-country." Quite the contrary, Holmberg, a junior at Tennessee, is considered by track coaches as one of the most promising young trackmen in the world. Last year Holmberg placed first in the famous Sugar Bowl mile.

Besides Holmberg, the Vols have two other outstanding harriers in Frank Albertson, who won the mile run in the inter-conference track meet last spring, and John Trent, holder of the two-mile crown in the same meet. Other capable Vols are Al Kuykendall, an impressive junior; Charles Wiats, whom Holmberg describes as "a typical cross-country runner;" Dick Gamble, "a freshman who has been looking very good in practice;" Rob Reeder, "half miler who is best on a flat course;" and Dick Kilwell, "a junior quarter miler who takes cross-country more as practice than actual competition." Comparative scores, a very poor test, indicate the Tar Heels will defeat their opponents. Last Tuesday Carolina topped the Blue Devils from Duke 22-26, while the Vols barely edged the Devils 26-30.

'Runt' Lowe One Of UNC's Great Stars

Frank Robbins (Runt) Lowe, Charlotte businessman who died Saturday following an extended illness, was one of Carolina's football immortals.

Lowe, a brilliant back, captained the 1921 team coached by Bob and Bill Fetzer. Contemporaries recall that he was a natural and instinctive athlete, one of the early triple-threat stars and one of the best. He also was a star on the University baseball team. Grady Pritchard, captain of the 1922 team, says "Runt" had no peer as an all-around performer. "He was one of the smartest players I ever saw," he adds, "and with Jim in the lineup we felt that we had a coach on the field."

Lowe was a brilliant passer. Pritchard recalls that in a game against Florida he completed something like 12 of 14 passes.

R. A. (Coach Bob) Fetzer, says "He was a great football player and the finest quarterback (field general) I ever coached. He always knew the play to call." Bill Fetzer, who also coached him in baseball, says Lowe would have made a fine major league player.

Ex-Tar Heel, Buddy Ager Wins Dutch Tennis Tourney

In an attempt to oust the "Yankee upstart," the Hollanders put Ager up against their present 4-time champ of the Netherlands. The Carolinian won handily 6-1, 6-4, to further his fame.

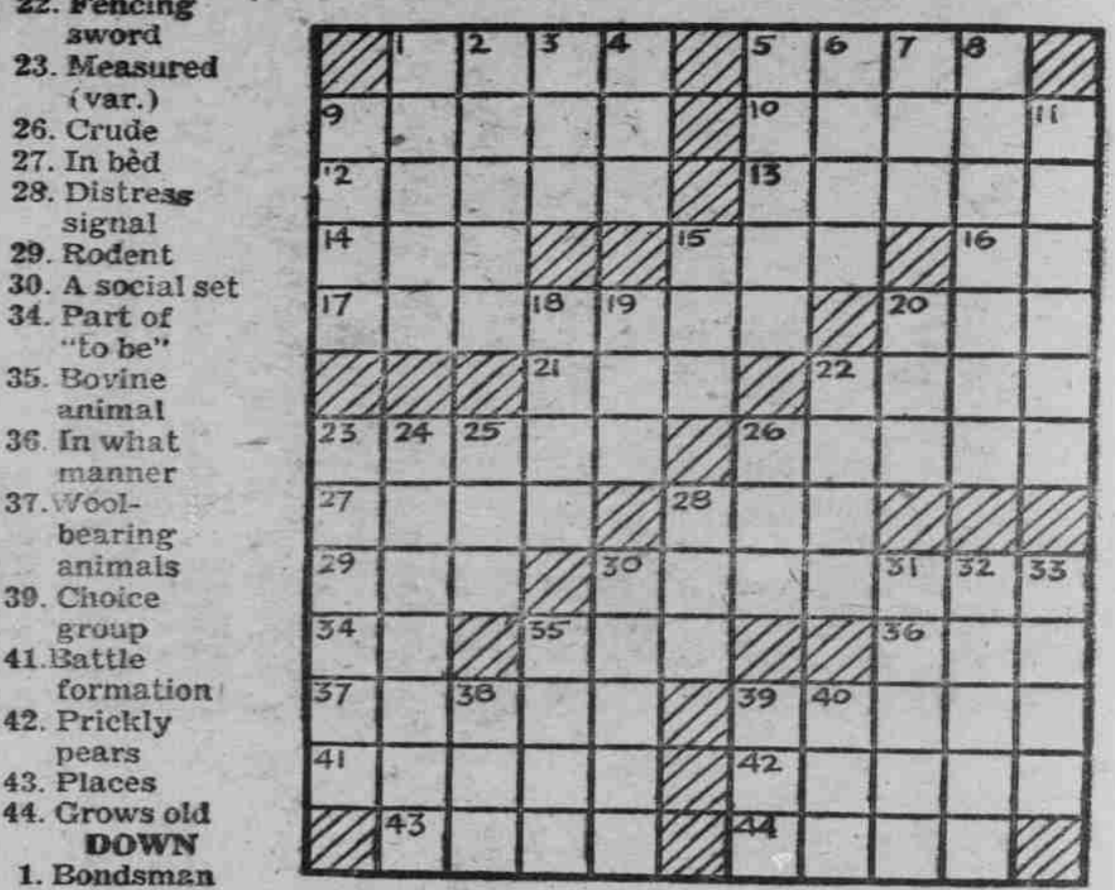
