

NC School Board Meets

Dr. Andrew Holt, administrative assistant to the President of the University of Tennessee, who has served as president of the National Education Association and as executive secretary of the Tennessee Educational Association, will address the 14th annual meeting of the North Carolina School Board Association to be held here today.

The complete program was announced today by Dean Guy B. Phillips of the School of Education, Executive Secretary of the Association. The meeting will get under way at 10:30 a.m. and

continue through the day. Thomas A. Banks, Raleigh, Association, said that "North Carolina is exceedingly fortunate to bring to its School Board Association a man with a wide range of experience in public education who is able to stimulate interest and to encourage action."

Others appearing on the program will include President Banks, E. M. Tuttle, Chicago, Ill., executive secretary of the National School Board Association, who will report on school board activities throughout the country; Dr. A. S. Hurlburt of the UNC School of Education, who has just completed a one-year survey of certain phases of public education in North Carolina; Dr. Amos Abrams, editor of the North Carolina Education Association magazine, who will lead a discussion of legislative activities, and Supt. W. M. Jenkins of the Durham county schools, a visiting lecturer in the School of Education here this academic year, who will lead a discussion on organization and activities of local school committee members.

In addition to the annual meeting, held here since the Association was organized in 1937, the members also attend district meetings held in eight different sections of the State each spring.

The program has been awarded first place honors for three consecutive years at the American Exhibition of Educational Radio Programs. All major networks as well as college radio groups competed in the contest.

Students, faculty members, and townspeople interested in radio drama are urged to attend tryouts, Clayton said.

Included in this season's show calendar which begins the first week in January are "Lion In The Streets," a story based on the life of William Lenoir by Jack Markham and John Clayton, and "Petticoat Invasion," a story on early coeds in Chapel Hill, by Betty Steele. Productions will be under direction of John Young and Clayton of the Department of Radio.

"The University Hour" is transmitted over leading stations throughout the state.

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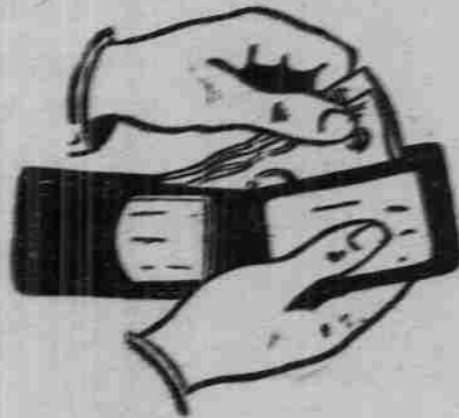
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
