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**Church Slates Annual Meet**

The tentative agenda for this year's annual Christian Citizenship Seminar for students was recently announced by the Methodist Student Movement, sponsor of the meetings.

The annual affair will be held February 14-20 in New York and Washington. This year's New York schedule consists of a guided tour of the United Nations building, with lunch in the delegates' dining room and a briefing by a member of the Secretariat; worship in New York churches; and dinner at a Japanese church. Delegates at Harold Ehrensperger, Ruth Harris, Mrs. Margaret Bender and Dr. Frederick Nolde give their views on various phases of Christian responsibility in modern times and the church's connection with the U. N.

Those attending the seminar will leave by train for Washington February 16, where they will visit various governmental groups and foreign embassies.

The meeting will close with an evaluation of what the delegates have learned from their seminar.

Gordon Gray, president of the University of North Carolina and former secretary of the Army, will preside at the luncheon.

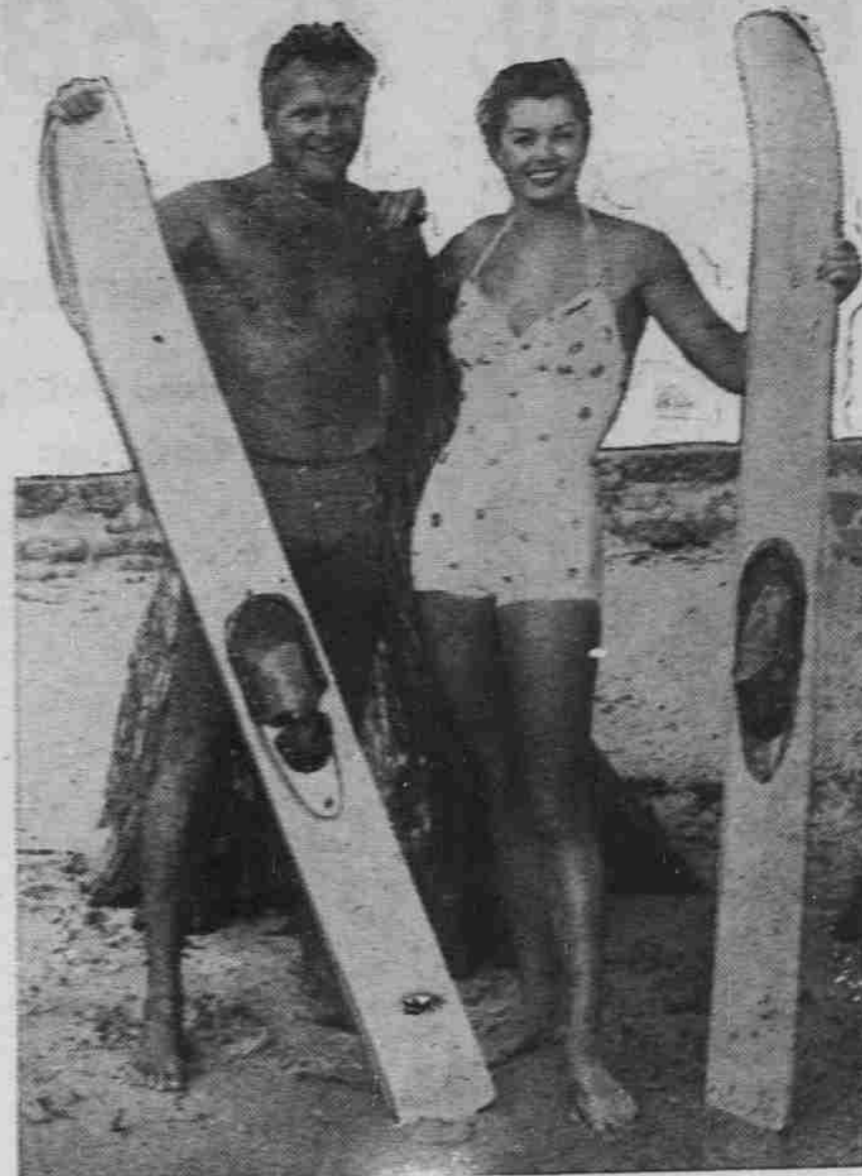
**Cosmopolitan's Film Program Starts Today**

antiphons for the various feasts of the Catholic church which the Music Department shows a copy of a monochord, an instrument used in the middle ages for the purpose of teaching intervals.

Moving on to the display on medieval polyphonic music, that of two or more simultaneously-sounding parts, the centerpiece is a clavichord which was constructed in 1951 in England. A companion piece is the facsimile of the 14th century "Roberts-bridge Codex," the oldest source of keyboard music.
