

Blue Devils Rally To Overcome Carolina, 67-63

Vayda Gets 21; Leads Scoring

Carolina Holds Lead Until Final Minutes

Duke's Blue Devils retained their Atlantic Coast Conference lead last night in Woollen Gym by staging a fourth quarter rally to overcome Carolina's upset-minded Tar Heels, 67-63, in a game that had the near-capacity crowd on edge from start to finish.

Superior reserve strength on the Blue Devil bench was the actual difference in the game, as two of Carolina's key players fouled out in the latter stages of the game. Carolina center Paul Likins had been playing one of his best games of the season and was keeping Carolina in the game with his rebounding when he fouled out after 8:19 of the third quarter.

Carolina forward Jerry Vayda was the leading scorer of the game as he poured in 21 points in the losing cause. Joe Belmont, Duke's brilliant guard, was high man for Duke and runner-up to Vayda for scoring honors with 20 points. Al Lifson scored 16 for Carolina.

The Tar Heels went into the fourth quarter with a three point lead but after 4:45 of the final period Belmont put the Devils ahead to stay with a one-handed push shot that gave Duke a 56-54 lead.

The Tar Heels were held to three field goals in the fourth quarter while being overtaken; but the strange thing was that Duke was able to score only field goals, thirteen foul shots, eight of them by Ronnie Mayer, making the final difference.

A Carolina drive in the second quarter, paced by the sensational driving layups of Skippy Winstead, saw the Tar Heels come from six points behind to end the first half with the score tied at 38-38. During their second quarter spurt, the Tar Heels hit eight of ten field goal attempts for an 80% shooting average. Carolina had a 36% average for the game.

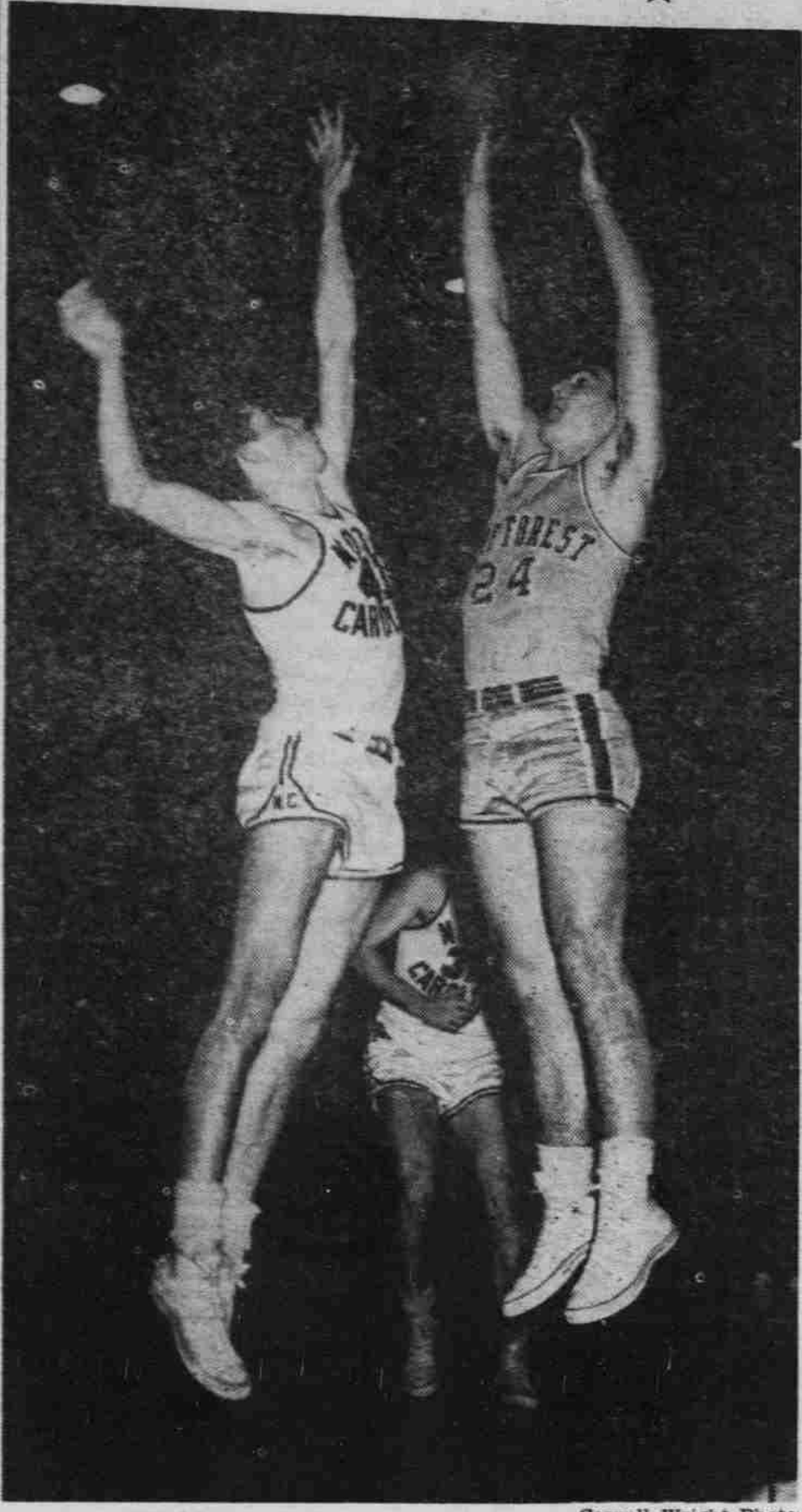
Backus Sets New Record; Shankle Into AAU Semis

NEW YORK, Feb. 20—(AP)—Bob Backus, a mighty man of muscle from the New York Athletic Club, got off a tremendous heave of 63 feet 5 inches, to better every indoor 35-pound weight throw record—both on and off the books—today in the National AAU Track and Field Championships.

The listed world indoor record is 60 feet 11 inches, set three years ago by Tom Bane of Tufts College, but that long since has been erased by Backus. Bob now has marks of 61-8 $\frac{3}{4}$ and 62-2 $\frac{1}{2}$ pending.

Backus had a discouraging experience in the event and it cost him recognition of an even more amazing record. On one of his tries he flipped the weight 64 feet 4 $\frac{3}{4}$ inches but when the iron was measured it was found to be three-sixteenth of an inch over regulation.

The qualifying rounds of the hurdles and 60-yard dash followed form. Harrison Dillard from Cleveland who is seeking his eighth straight AAU timber championship, led the pack into the semifinal round. He was joined by Joel Shankle of Duke and six others.

Staunton, Granby Champions Of Interscholastic Swimming

Seven meet records were broken and another tied at Staunton Military Academy and Granby High School of Norfolk, Va., successfully defended their crowns here yesterday in the eighth annual Southern Interscholastic Swimming Championships.

Staunton's strong cadets easily retained the prep school title, amassing a total of 90 points, 20 more than their nearest opponent, Georgia Military Academy.

Granby collected 62 points to win in the high school division with Greensboro second with 53 points.

Following Staunton and GMA in

the prep division were Sewanee Military Academy with 30 and Augusta Military Academy and Asheville School for Boys with 19 points each.

Granby and Greensboro were trailed in the high school division by High Point with 39, Athens, Ga., with 29, Rafeigh 22, Bearden of Knoxville, Tenn., 14, Edmonds nine, and Wilmington five.

The high school record breakers follow:

100-yard breaststroke—Tommy Paymale (Granby); 200-yard freestyle—Tommy Shiffman (Greensboro); 100-yard back stroke—Bob Black (Athens, Ga.); 150-yard individual medley—Jim Coventry (Bearden of Knoxville); 150-yard medley relay—Granby.

New prep school records were established by Lee Lawrence of Staunton, 200-yard freestyle; Jeff Zureker of Staunton, 150-yard individual medley; and the Staunton 200-yard relay team.

Thirteen schools in all competed in the event sponsored by the University.

Tar Babies Finally Whip Duke, 75-70

Rosenbluth And Quigg Lead Revenge Victory

The North Carolina freshmen, upset over their three previous losses to the Duke yearlings this year, turned the tables on the visitors in Woollen Gym last night as they racked up a 75-70 victory. A last minute spurt by the Blue Imps made the final count read closer than the game really was.

The contest started slowly as each team missed shot after shot. The initial period ended 12-12, and neither team had held more than a three-point lead.

The action picked up in the second quarter and with Bob Young doing most of the scoring, the Tar Babies took a 19-15 margin. Then Lenny Rosenbluth, who had only one point during the first quarter, helped Carolina build up a 33-27 halftime advantage as he dunked 12 quick markers.

The Tar Babies stretched their lead to 43-34 with six minutes to play in the third period, and swapped baskets for the remainder of that quarter.

The ten-point spread stayed intact throughout the first seven minutes of the final stanza until the Blue Imps put on a fine rally, but the advantage was just too much for them to attempt to overcome.

Joe Quigg led the Tar Babies with 25 points and Rosenbluth followed with 24. Rappaport and Lakata led the losers with 17 and 16 points, respectively.

Carolina, who plays the Wake Forest frosh at Wake Forest Monday night, hit on 29 of 55 attempts for a phenomenal 53% average.

Johnny Palmer Of Charlotte Has Long Lead, Making All-Time PGA Record In Texas Open

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Feb. 20 (AP)—Grim little Johnny Palmer of Charlotte, N. C., cut a seven-under-par 64 to set an all-time PGA record for 54 holes at 191 today and take a long lead in the \$12,500 Texas Open despite a record-tying 60 turned in by Ted Kroll of New Hartford, N. Y.

The chunky veteran of the tour holds a five-stroke lead as the field of 90 turns toward the final 18 holes of this storied tournament.

Kroll's 60 was registered in early afternoon and it looked for a time as if Palmer might break that. He did the first nine in 30 strokes but ran into trouble on the second nine and had 34.

It was the greatest day for records this 6,400-yard Brackenridge Park Course has ever known. Palmer's 191 broke the mark set in 1945 by Byron Nelson at Seattle by two strokes and it was seven

strokes under the Texas Open record set by Jack Burke in 1952.

The 35-year-old Palmer also appears on the way to a new Texas Open record for 72 holes and possibly a new PGA record. Nelson did 259 in his 1945 round. Ben Hogan tied that at Greenbrier, W. Va., six years later.

Kroll's great round tied the all-time PGA record for 18 holes set by Al Brosch of Garden City, N. Y., here in 1951 and tied by

Bill Nary of Los Angeles at El Paso in 1952. And little Ted might have broken the record if a 6-foot putt had dropped on the eighteenth green. The ball barely missed the hole.
