Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra Plays Free Tonight **Director Johnson Is UNC Music Graduate**

Thor Johnson, director of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra playing here tonight, is a graduate of UNC.

Johnson received his B.A. degree in music here in 1934.

The orchestra will be presented by the Student Entertainment Committee tonight at 8 o'clock in Memorial Hall. The performance will be free to students. Townspeople will be

admitted at a cost of \$1 per persecondary school in 1930, Johnson to all seats available after 7:40.

Johnson, who was appointed the permanent music director if the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra in the 1947-48 season, was born in Wisconsin | Rapids, Wisconsin, in 1913. His father, whose forebears were Norwegian seamen, was a minister of the Moravian Church. His mother was a pianist and teacher of music.

While Johnson was still young, his family moved to Winston-Salem, where he attended school. After having graduated from






