New Carolina Playmaker Production Is Written By UNC Graduate Baxter Sasser

A new Carolina folk comedy, Fayetteville, as Keith Lambert; written by a former University graduate student, will be presented by The Carolina Playmakers tomorrow through Sunday, March 25.

Performances will be given nightly at 8:30 o'clock, with a special matinee on Sunday at 2:30 p.m. "Cat in Gloves", a full-length play by UNC graduate Baxter Sasser, is the new production, written in the vein of the early UNC student-written dramas during the era of Frederick H. (Proff) Koch, former head of the Playmakers. Among the early folk-play writers were Paul Green, Bernice Kelly Harris, and Thomas Wolfe, who studied playwriting before he became a novelist.

Sasser is a native of Mt. Olive, in the area in which his play takes place. After completing his M.A. degree at UNC last summer, he took a teaching position at St. Mary's College, St. Mary's, Md. His "Cat in Gloves" began as a one-act play presented two years ago, called "Jezebel Shoes."
