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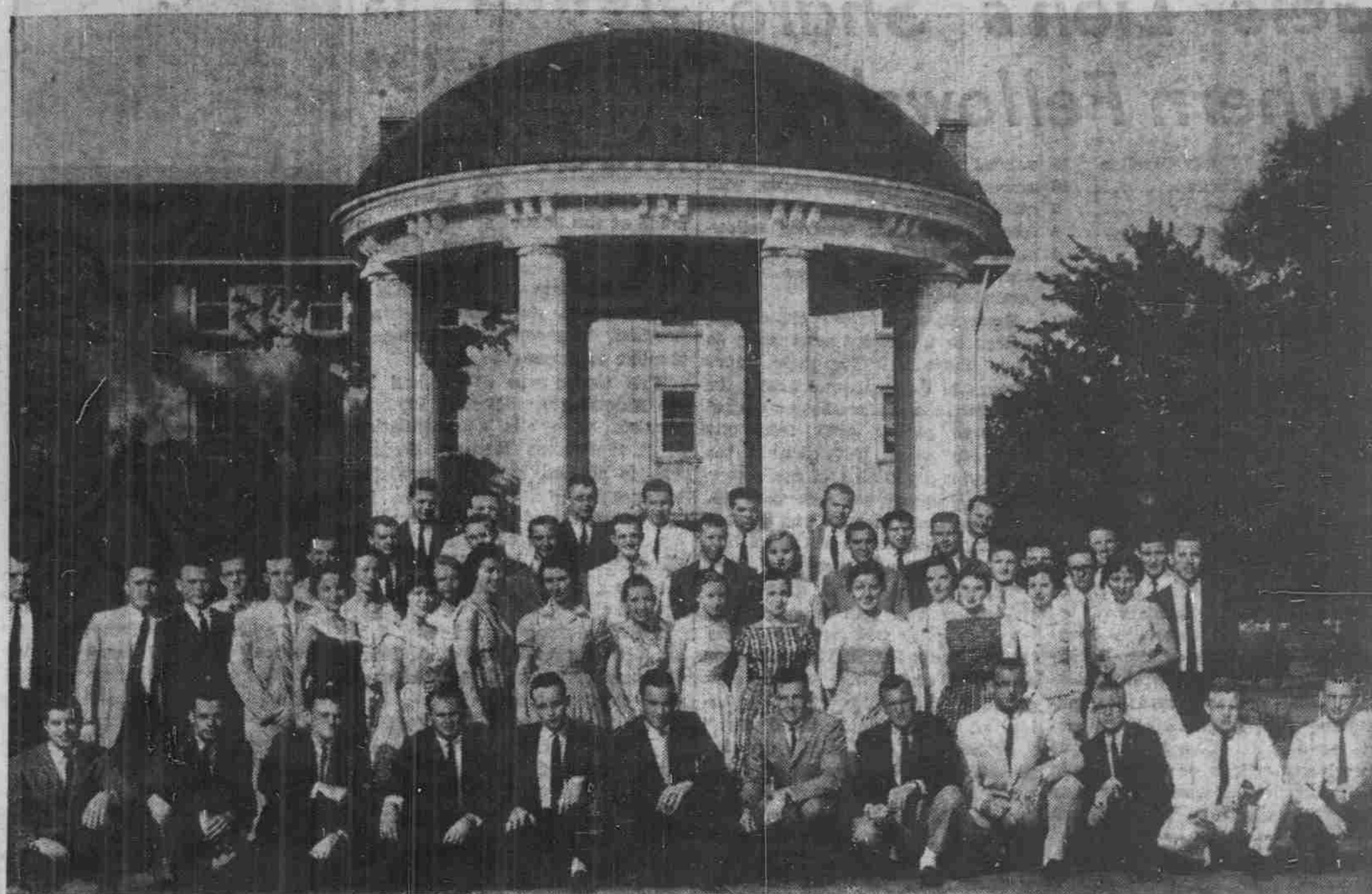

New Professor In Med School

Dr. Peter Paul Vaughn has been named assistant professor in the Department of Anatomy of the School of Medicine here.

This announcement was made by Chancellor Robert B. House with the approval of President William C. Friday and the UNC Board of Trustees.

Dr. Vaughn is a native of Altoona, Penn. He received his B.A. degree from Brooklyn College in 1950. His M.A. degree was awarded in 1952 and his Ph.D. degree was given in 1954, both by Harvard University.

He was a teaching fellow at Harvard 1950-52 and an instructor at UNC during 1954-56. During the last academic year he was an assistant professor at the University of Kansas.

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67 Inducted Into Membership Of Society Of Sigma Xi Friday Night

Thirty-seven scientists at the University of North Carolina were taken into full membership of the Society of Sigma Xi at the annual initiation banquet Friday night, at which 30 other persons were admitted as associate members.

Dr. George O. Doak, who has been president of the UNC chapter during 1956-57, presided at the banquet in Lenoir Hall and gave his presidential address at a program following in Venable Hall.

In his address Dr. Doak discussed research progress within the Venereal Disease Experimental Laboratory in Chapel Hill, of which he is assistant director.

Dr. Doak explained that since 1943, when penicillin replaced arsenic drugs in the treatment of syphilis, scientists have been developing drugs which are compounds of phosphorus and testing them against organisms which cause syphilis and other diseases.

"Many of these drugs show promising therapeutic properties," Dr. Doak reported, "but at this time we cannot say that they will be of any value."

Dr. Doak explained that the research with organophosphorus compounds has a double object: (1) finding the life cycle of the organism which cause syphilis and finding which drugs are effective in destroying it; and (2) finding drugs other than penicillin which might be non-toxic and might be used in cases where penicillin cannot be used, such as patients with a sensitivity to penicillin.

Dr. Doak, who joined the UNC faculty in 1948, is a native of Canada and took his doctorate in pharmaceutical chemistry at the University of Wisconsin. For 10 years before he came to Chapel Hill he was a research associate at John Hopkins.
