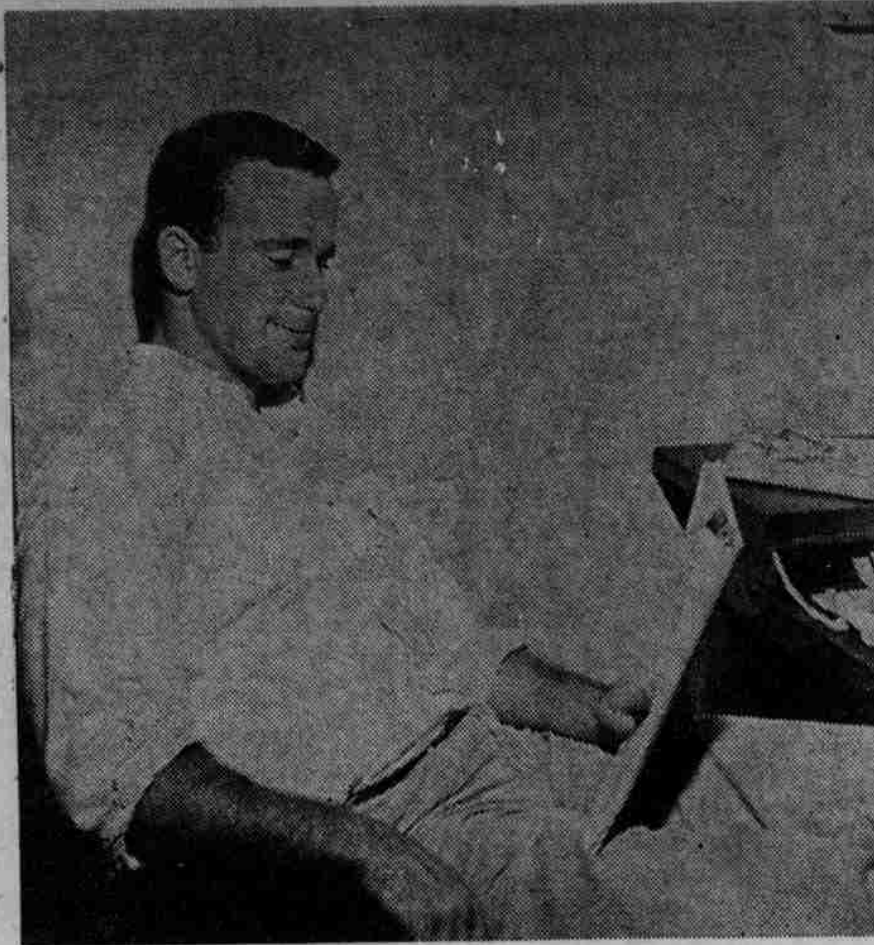
And the exception to the rule is "There are no exceptions to the rule" even for a swim party planned by the Summer School Activities Councils.
