

Va. Matmen Hand UNC Double Loss

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va. — Carolina's varsity and freshman wrestling teams began the season on a sour note here last night, suffering a double defeat at the hands of the Virginia Cavaliers. The varsity lost, 25-11 and the frosh, 21-13.

The Tar Heel grapplers could never get started against the talented Cavalier teams as four Tar Heel varsity members were pinned and three frosh went the same route.

In the varsity event, Perrin Henderson at 137 J. W. Welborn at 147, and Dave Atkins at 167 were the only Tar Heels to gain victory. Henderson decided Everette, Welborn pinned Shepherd and Atkinson decided Scuggs.

Russell Fills
Ray Russell, filling in for Jack Gray of Carolina in the heavyweight division suffered a pulled muscle and had to forfeit to Parrott of Virginia. Russell was ahead when he was injured.

In the freshman division, Chip Woodrow (123) pinned Florence of Virginia. Gene White at 167 pinned Rogers of the Cavaliers and John Matney of Carolina gained a decision over Harris, 5-2.

Coach Sam Barnes said after the match that the Tar Heels looked bad in their season opener but feels that his squad will come back strong against Washington and Lee in Lexington tonight. That match is scheduled to start at eight o'clock.

Cunningham, Kearns and Brennan were all stars of that fabulous team of a year ago and either is capable of achieving All-American recognition. Cunningham and Kearns will probably be the starting guards with Brennan at one forward. If this is the case, then McGuire will probably go with the taller men, Kepley, Shaffer, Lotz and Stanley to fill the two vacant spots.

The Tigers are supposed to be a much-improved team over the one which last year finished with a 7-17 record. The club of veterans is led by high-scoring guard Ed Brinkley and forward shooting ace Vince Yoekel.

Edwards Wins Top Honors; Tatum Third

Raleigh, Dec. 6 (AP) — Earle Edwards, coach of North Carolina State's Atlantic Coast Conference football champions, today was named by the Atlantic Coast Sportswriters Assn. as The Coach of the Year.

Edwards received 58 first place votes from the 78 sportswriters, sportscasters and college publicity men balloting and scored 338 points out of a possible 390 to take the honors.

Frank Howard of Clemson was runner up with 159 points. The points were awarded on a basis of five for first, three for second and one for third.

Other coaches receiving votes were: Bill Murray of Duke, Tommy Mont of Maryland and Ben Martin of Virginia. Last year Paul Amen of Wake Forest won the award.

With his team tabbed the "dark-horse" of the ACC race this year, Edwards directed State to a 7-1-2 record and a 5-0-1 conference mark.

The popular Wolfpack mentor, in his fourth year at the head coaching position at State College, saw his team also take Big Four honors by beating Carolina 7-0, Wake Forest 19-0 and tying Duke 14-14.

State's record was its best since 1946 when N. C. State finished with a 8-2 record. The award was the second writers association honor to be won by N. C. State. Dick Christy, its All-American back, was named player of the year earlier this week.

880 Records

Scurlock, a 6-4 180 pounder from Greensboro, has been setting track records since he was in high school. He is the only North Carolinian to run a half-mile under two minutes while in high school. He set the standing record of 1:56.2 at the 1954 State High School meet.

His best time for the event is 1:48.2 which is a University records. His greatest performance was at the NCAA Outdoor Track Championships held in Austin Texas last spring. He finished third with a 1:48.2, the third best time ever run
