Raper Is Symposium Class Seminar Head

John Raper, senior from Fayetteville, is currently serving as chairman of the Classroom-Departmental Seminar Committee of the Carolina Symposium on Public Affairs.

Raper in commenting on the purpose and progress of his committee to date stated: "The purpose of the Departmental Seminar Committee is to invite supplementary speakers to participate in classroom lectures in the morning and afternoon seminars aimed at students majoring in the various departments.

Specific Subjects

"These speakers will speak on the specific subject of each department as it is affected by the theme of the General Symposium—survival.

"Many of the departments through this committee and the Symposium have invited important men in their fields from the surrounding area to speak during Symposium Week on some phase of the general topic. "The Departmental-Seminar Committee is responsible too for arranging the schedule of the main speakers in classroom lectures. The committee is currently working with each University department and school in co-ordinating a Symposium program that will present to the students the theme, specifically through classroom lectures and afternoon seminars on a departmental level.

"Many of our own faculty members, who are well qualified to speak on some general phase of the theme, have been invited. We are also working with different organizations on campus to help bring about a successful conclusion to our part of the program.

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DANISH PROFESSOR CHRISTIAN MOLLER To Lecture Both Here And At Duke University

World Authority On Earth Satellites Plans Lectures At UNC & Duke

A Danish scientist, working in Chapel Hill for two months on gravitation, relativity and related influences in connection with artificial earth satellites and atomic clocks, is lecturing four times at UNC and Duke University during the month of February.

Dr. Christian Moller of the University of Copenhagen spoke first on Monday at a seminar in the Physics Department at Phillips Hall here.

Dr. Moller's research at UNC is sponsored by the Institute of Field Physics, a project which is privately financed and undertakes to pursue studies in gravitation, particularly in areas in which Albert Einstein was performing research at the time of his death. Dr. Moller's study deals with gravitational waves. He also studies energy density, whether it is unique and whether a similar thing can be done with momentum energy. He is investigating the implications of these results for the quantization of the gravitational fields.

Other lectures by Dr. Moller in the theoretical seminars and the Joint Duke-Carolina Physics Colloquium are Feb. 5 at Duke, Feb.

10 at Duke and Feb. 17 at Chapel Hill.

The topic on Monday, Feb. 3 is "The Energy-Momentum Tensor in General Relativity."

Dr. Moller is a world-renowned theoretical physicist and has long been a professor at the University of Copenhagen.

He was recently appointed director of NORDITA, a scientific joint enterprise of Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden.

In his work here, Dr. Moller is associated with the research team of Dr. Bryce DeWitt and Dr. Cecile DeWitt, who head the Institute of Field Physics.

Established last fall in Copenhagen NORDITA was planned to facilitate close cooperation between universities in the parent countries and to provide opportunities for advanced theoretical study for post-doctoral physicists.

Supported by the five countries on a population basis NORDITA (Nordic Institute for Theoretical Physics) started its work in Copenhagen after the Theoretical Study Group of CERN there was moved to Geneva.

With a permanent faculty of outstanding physicists NORDITA will also play host to foreign physicists. It is thus hoped to provide a firm basis for collaboration inside the field of theoretical physics, according to Dr. Moller.

home. When she asked him his name he told her it was "Satterwhite" and then "Stevenson." When he fled from the house Mrs. Carmichael got a description of the car and his license number.

Chapel Hill police found that the New Jersey license plate which he had on his car had been stolen from a car in Durham. However, with the description of the car police were able to trace the car to Satterwhite.

He was apprehended Friday at 8 p.m.

Within a half hour Satterwhite had admitted to the setting of a fire Jan. 23 at the D. A. MacPherson residence, and to breaking and entering the Carmichael home. He later admitted the other blazes, officers said.

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
