## 'The Cocktail Party' Opens Tonight In Gerrard Hall For Two-Day Run

"The Cocktail Party" by T. S. Eliot, one of the most influential poets of the 20th century, will be presented tonight and tomorrow night in Gerrard Hall at 8 p.m. Seven stars headline the presentation, including Peter Sinclair, economics instructor; Betty Rhodes, dramatic arts major; Russell Link, dramatic arts major; Betty Sinclair, drama critic for the Chapel Hill Weekly; Sam Baker, grad student; Dorothy Walters, graduate dramatic art student; and Ben Clymer, graduate library science major.

All the cast has had previous dramatic experience, and many have appeared in Playmaker and Petite Dramatique productions on this campus. Jackson in his announcement added that he believed that T. S. Eliot was perhaps the most influential poet of the 20th century.

He felt, however, that Eliot, probably largely due to his background, was a snob. This is not to say that he was not cognizant of vulgarity, but according to Jackson, Eliot was always seeking refinement.

Jackson went on to say, "This innate and cultivated snobbery has always tended to lessen Eliot's impact as a philosophical writer, both poet and playwright, for it is a common fault in us to seek in our lives a credo for the majority—the mass."

Concern Over Struggle Jackson went on to explain that "Eliot, for all his intellectualism is deeply concerned with the struggle of the human personality to reach some kind of spiritual fulfillment. We defy anyone to see 'The Cock-

# Brennan Hits 29 To Pace UNC Cagers In 66-59 Victory Over Maryland Terps

## Tar Heels Hold 10-3 ACC Record

Pete Brennan swung a wicked hatchet and his Carolina teammates celebrated George Washington's birthday by chopping down the Maryland Terps, 66-59 before 5,500 screaming fans in Woollen Gym last night. The senior forward from Brooklyn hit 15 for 20 shots from the free throw line and wound up the night with a total of 29 points to lead the way making Maryland's trek along Tobacco Road a most unprofitable one. The Terps lost to Duke Friday night.

## Election Of Mardi Gras Royalty Set

of free throws to send Carolina ahead again but Nacinek's jumper tied it at 53 all at the 4:51 point. Sophomore Lee Shaffer, who proved valuable in the clutches, then hit a follow shot but Maryland's Julian Weingarten countered with a jump at 4:21. Brennan did it again with 4:04 left to make it 57-55 and Shaffer's tap moments later ran the point spread to four. Harvey Salz, who played another great game, then drove in for a basket to make it 61-55. Salz stole the throw in, passed to Cunningham who was fouled. Bobby hit two free throws, then turned right around and stole another throw in, passed to Brennan and Nacinek fouled out as he tried to stop Pete's shot. Brennan dropped in two from the line and Carolina had an insuperable lead of 65-55. From there out the two clubs battled on almost even terms, Maryland finally closing the gap to seven points.

## Half-Game Behind Duke

It was Carolina's 10th conference win against three losses. The Tar Heels now trail Duke (10-2) by a half game with only the game in Durham left to play. The Tar Heels are 17-5 for the season. The loss made the Terps 8-5 in the ACC and 14-6 overall. (See BASKETBALL, page 4)

## New Union Discussed

The pressing need for a new student union at UNC was pointed out to the Board of Higher Education Friday as administrative officials met with the board in its biennial visit to the campus. Chancellor William B. Aycock said the board looked with "manifest interest" upon the proposed student union building for which the University will seek funds in the next biennium. The structure is expected to cost over \$1 million.

Meeting with the board for about two hours of discussion Friday, the administration also cited needs of the library and aired other problems and projects confronting the University, Aycock said. Noteworthy among these were the "importance of the balanced program of the University in the sense of strong undergraduate school, graduate school and professional schools," Aycock said, along with salaries and research at the University.

"They showed a great interest in the graduate work and wanted to know a great deal about it," the Chancellor continued.

Concerning the proposed student union, Aycock said Dean of Student Affairs Fred Weaver "made a presentation to show its importance in an educational system, not just something of luxury, but of vital importance to the University."

He said the administration pointed out to the board its intentions "to push for a new student union" in the next biennium, 1959-61, as a key project to be implemented during that period.

The visit here was one of three to the Consolidated University by the Board of Higher Education on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Visits were made at State College in Raleigh and Woman's College in Greensboro before the meeting here. Of even greater significance next week will be a meeting of the Board of Trustees in Greensboro, slated for a session Monday.

## Senator Spencer Bell To Speak Here Monday

The possibility of sweeping changes in the North Carolina judiciary system will be discussed by State Senator Spencer Bell at a meeting here Monday night. The program, a joint meeting of the Law School Association and the Chapel Hill chapter of the League of Women Voters, will begin at 8 p.m. in the court room of Manning Hall.

The senator from Charlotte is an attorney and is chairman of the N. C. Bar Association Committee on Improving and Expediting the Administration of Justice in North Carolina.

He will discuss the work of that committee in his talk. Senator Bell has been active also in the legislative movement to reapportion representative voting districts in North Carolina.

A reception is to follow Bell's speech, and both functions will be open to the public. Herbert Toms Jr. of Shelby is in charge of arrangements for the Law School Association's part of the program. Chairman of the League of Women Voters' participation is Mrs. R. H. Wettach.

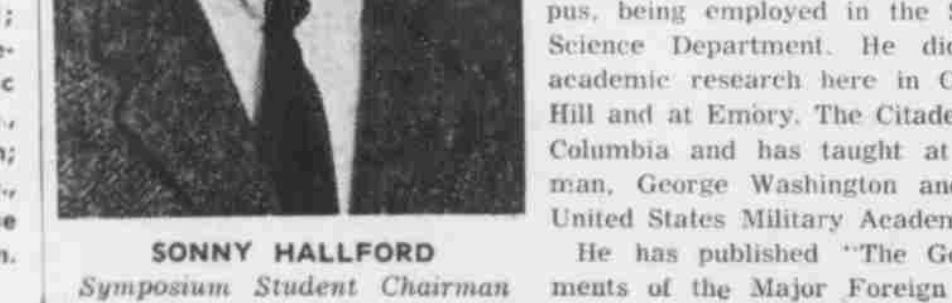
## Church Group Plans Lecture

This lecture is being given under the auspices of Christian Science Society Chapel Hill, a branch of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

The Society regularly holds church services in Room 2, Carroll Hall. The Sunday service is at 11 a.m., and Sunday School convenes at 9:30 a.m. Evening meetings, at which testimonies of healing are given, are held on the first Wednesday of the month, at 8 p.m.

The Society does not conduct a reading room, but all authorized books on Christian Science are available at the University library. The lecture and church services are open to the public.

## Campus Chest Fund To Aid Nessfeness

The Campus Chest theme of this year "Help Them to Help Themselves" will certainly apply to "Nessfeness," one of the three agencies which the raised money will go toward helping.

"Nessfeness," abbreviation for the National Scholarship Service and Fund for Negro Students, is geared to bring together qualified student and educational opportunities. However, it is a service and not a social action program. It accomplishes this purpose by attempting to seek out gifted individuals.

The organization was established in 1947 for the purpose of broadening and increasing opportunities for qualified Negro students who are accepted by universities whose admission policy is not exclusive.

Out of the organization has grown the Community Talent Search, which assists local communities in discovering their hidden talents, human resources or their undiscovered gifted youth from all economically and culturally deprived groups, regardless of race, creed, or sex.

"Nessfeness" began after research revealed how few negroes really had an opportunity for college education.

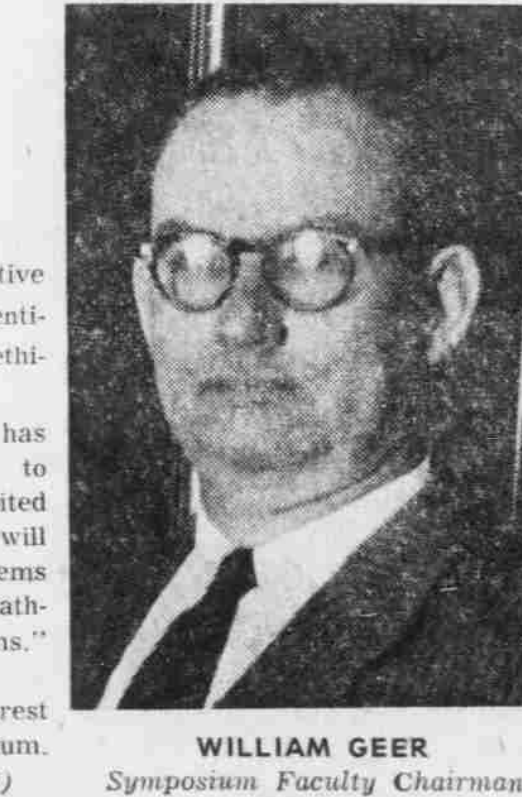
