### Frost To Visit UNC

Robert Frost will make his 12th annual visit to Chapel Hill this week and will lecture Friday, March 14th at 8 p.m. in Hill Hall. The public is invited.

A "Visiting Poet in English," Frost also will speak to graduates and upperclassmen in English at Bingham Hall Saturday morning, March 15.

His appearance in here is sponsored by the Department of English of which Professor Hugh Holman is chairman.

While in the village, Frost will be the house guest of Prof. and Mrs. Clifford P. Lyons of the English Department.

The famous poet is coming to Chapel Hill from Washington, D. C. where he was a guest at the White House. This has been a personally busy year for Frost. He has been in England and received honorary degrees from the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge and Edinburgh. He also holds an honorary degree from the University of North Carolina.

In his early visits to Chapel Hill he always attracts large crowds at his public appearances, and in classroom discussions and other informal gatherings his conversational and philosophical observations have become a tradition here.

Ability to find the universal in the particular, and the timeless in the timely, Frost has produced volumes of poetry, hundreds of poems being well-known favorites. These he will read and talk about this weekend.

### SP Plans To Nominate Executives

### Terps Dethrone Tar Heels In 2nd Half Comeback 86-74

REYNOLDS COLISEUM, RALEIGH—Maryland's mighty Terps used the free throw line to dethrone the Carolina Tar Heels as Atlantic Coast Conference basketball champs, 86-74 here last night before a packed house of 12,500.

The Terps converted an amazing total of 28 foul shots in the last four minutes and 24 second an Carolina's defense of its National title went further down the drain with every Maryland charity toss.

It was a tremendous reversal of form by the inspired Terps who became the first team outside the Big Four to ever win the ACC title. Maryland trailed the Tar Heels at intermission, 34-27 but Bud Millikan's crew came back an entirely different club in the second stanza and the College Park team completely overwhelmed the Tar Heels who defeated South Carolina for the championship here last year.

Pete Brennan and Tommy Kearns, who along with Bobby Cunningham and Roy Searcy closed out their college career, hit 29 and 20 points respectively but even their gallant effort was no match for the Terps' unbelievable performance from the free throw line.

Maryland showed it would not lay down and play dead from the very beginning of the second half. The Terps began chopping away at the Tar Heel's lead and at the 15:57 mark, their sophomore sensation Charlie McNeil hit a jump from the coner to make it 39-35. McNeil led the assault from there out and the Terps continued to move closer. McNeil hit a free throw moments later to make it 39-37 with 14:44 left.

Kearns hit on a beautiful drive and Harvey Salz got a foul shot to send Carolina back out front by 42-37 but McNeil's jump from the corner, a field goal by John Nacinek and a bucket by Davis shot the Terps ahead, 43-42 with 12:18 to play.

With Brennan leading the way for the Tar Heels and McNeil for the Terps, the lead changed hands

### Ralph Marterie Concert Set Tomorrow Evening

Popular Band leader Ralph Marterie will present his orchestra in Memorial Hall Monday night at 8 o'clock in a concert sponsored by the Panhellenic and Interfraternity Councils.

Proceeds from the concert will go to the Chapel Hill Negro Recreation Center. Tickets for \$1.25 may be purchased in Y Court, Ledbetter's, Town and Campus and at the door Monday night.

The two Greek organizations sponsor a joint project each year for benefit of usually a local charity.

After checking with the Welfare Department, the two groups decided upon giving proceeds from the Marterie concert to the Negro Recreation Center.

Because of a lack of response to the Chapel Hill Community Chest this year, insufficient funds would have affected the recreation center, closing it June 1.

Although the facilities of the center are limited, it serves to accommodate around 400 children who come there daily while their parents work. The number of children who attend the center is always greater in the summer season, which this year will see the closing down of the recreation center if funds remain inadequate.

Although the program for the Marterie concert has not been released, it is expected that he will perform some of his hit records and selections from several albums.

In his youth, his flaming trumpet helped Ralph Marterie become popular in Chicago radio studios and he regularly took part in such famous orchestras as Paul Whiteman, Frank Black, Roy Shields and Percy Faith.

### Symposium Panel Will Discuss Higher Education For Women Today

Four noted educators will participate in a panel discussion on the higher education of women, as part of the Symposium Week's activities. The panel discussion is scheduled for 4 to 6 p.m., March 17 in Carroll Hall.

**Coeds Here 60 Years**  
The idea for the forum stemmed from Dean of Women Katherine Kennedy Carmichael, who felt that since this year marks the 60th anniversary of the first coed on the UNC campus, the topic of higher education for women would be a fitting one for this year's Symposium.

The point of view of a college which educates the sexes separately will be presented by Dr. Chalmers G. Davidson, director of the library and professor of history at Davidson College.

**Coed College**  
Associate professor and dean of romance languages, Dr. William C. Archie will point out the philosophy behind a coeducational college.

The coordinated college viewpoint will be given by Dr. Marguerite Roberts, dean and professor of English at Westhampton College, University of Richmond.

Moderating the discussion will be Chancellor Gordon Blackwell of Woman's College in Greensboro.

Some of the questions that probably will be discussed include: college organization with respect to women; difference in college's policy with respect to the type college it is, public, church supported, or private; what ideally should be the education of a woman, how does it differ from that of a man and what does the public think of the various types of education.

Each participant will give a short talk, and at the end of a discussion period, the forum will be open for questions from the audience.

Students, faculty, and townspeople have been invited.

### news in brief

**'Urge To Kill'**  
SANFORD, March 8 (AP)—Testimony that Frank Edward Wetzel developed "an urge to kill" during a six-year prison hitch was heard in Lee County Superior Court Monday.

Henry Lostaunau, a Bakersfield, Calif., detective, quoted Wetzel as saying he bolted on a wild cross-country flight rather than return to New York's Attica prison.

"He said there were two or three fellows there he would have to 'do in' if he were sent back to prison," the detective testified. Wetzel's life is at stake in his trial here on a charge of murdering Highway Patrolman J. T. Brown. The handsome defendant, his expression impassive, flinched slightly as he heard Lostaunau on the witness stand.

Judge George Fountain adjourned the week-old trial until Monday morning.

**Mack's Pay**  
WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—Rep. Harris (D-Ark.) said today Richard A. Mack may have had an income of up to \$75,000 in two years when his official pay as a Federal Communications commissioner was only around half that amount.

At the same time Harris announced the scheduling of Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower's brother-in-law, Col. George Gordon Moore, for under-oath testimony March 17 before Harris' House subcommittee investigating regulatory agencies.

**All Shook Up**  
WILMINGTON, March 8 (AP)—The ninth earth tremor of the last three weeks in this coastal area was reported today.

A citizen in Carolina Beach nine miles from here, and another in Wilmington, reported a rumbling in the earth at 1:48 p.m. There was no damage.

The military has denied any firings which could cause the tremors. Some have been recorded on seismographs.

nine times and was tied twice before the Terps went ahead to stay, 58-56 on McNeil's hook with exactly five minutes remaining.

It was then that the Terps took to the charity line to completely wreck any Tar Heel hopes of repeating as National champs. There were but five field goals by both clubs in the final five minutes. The Tar Heels also hit well from the free throw line but Maryland got the most opportunities and took full advantage of the fact.

Kearns tried desperately to keep the Tar Heels in the game during the Maryland hot streak but the Terps were just too deadly.

The Tar Heels got in trouble early with fouls and several Tar Heels were in precarious shape throughout almost the entire second half. Seven Carolinians wound up with a total of four fouls.

For the entire game, Maryland hit a total of 40 free throws in 52 attempts for a new record and there in lay the story of this exciting contest. Carolina converted 28 of 37 charity tosses.

Maryland's shooting percentage was 41.8 and the Tar Heel's was 39.0. The Terps grabbed 36 rebounds, one less than the Tar Heels.

### Reservation Deadline Set For UNC Rooms

Men and women students have been reminded of impending deadlines for room reservations.

Men students now living in dormitories have the option of reserving space for the summer and fall sessions, the UNC Housing Office announced Saturday.

A room reserved for the summer session only does not entitle students to that space in the fall, housing officials said.

The Housing Office emphasized room reservation deposits for the summer and fall must be made with the University cashier in South Building not later than April 22.

For summer housing, double rooms will be available in Joyner first session only, Old West, Grimes and Manley dormitories. Connor will be open to graduate men.

The rent in these dormitories will be \$20 for each session; the deposit also will be \$20.

Single rooms will be open in Steele, Ruffin and Mangum. Rent for these rooms will be \$30 and the deposit will be \$30 for each session.

Housing for married couples will be available in Alexander Dormitory. The rent for these rooms will be \$40 and the deposit \$40 per session.
