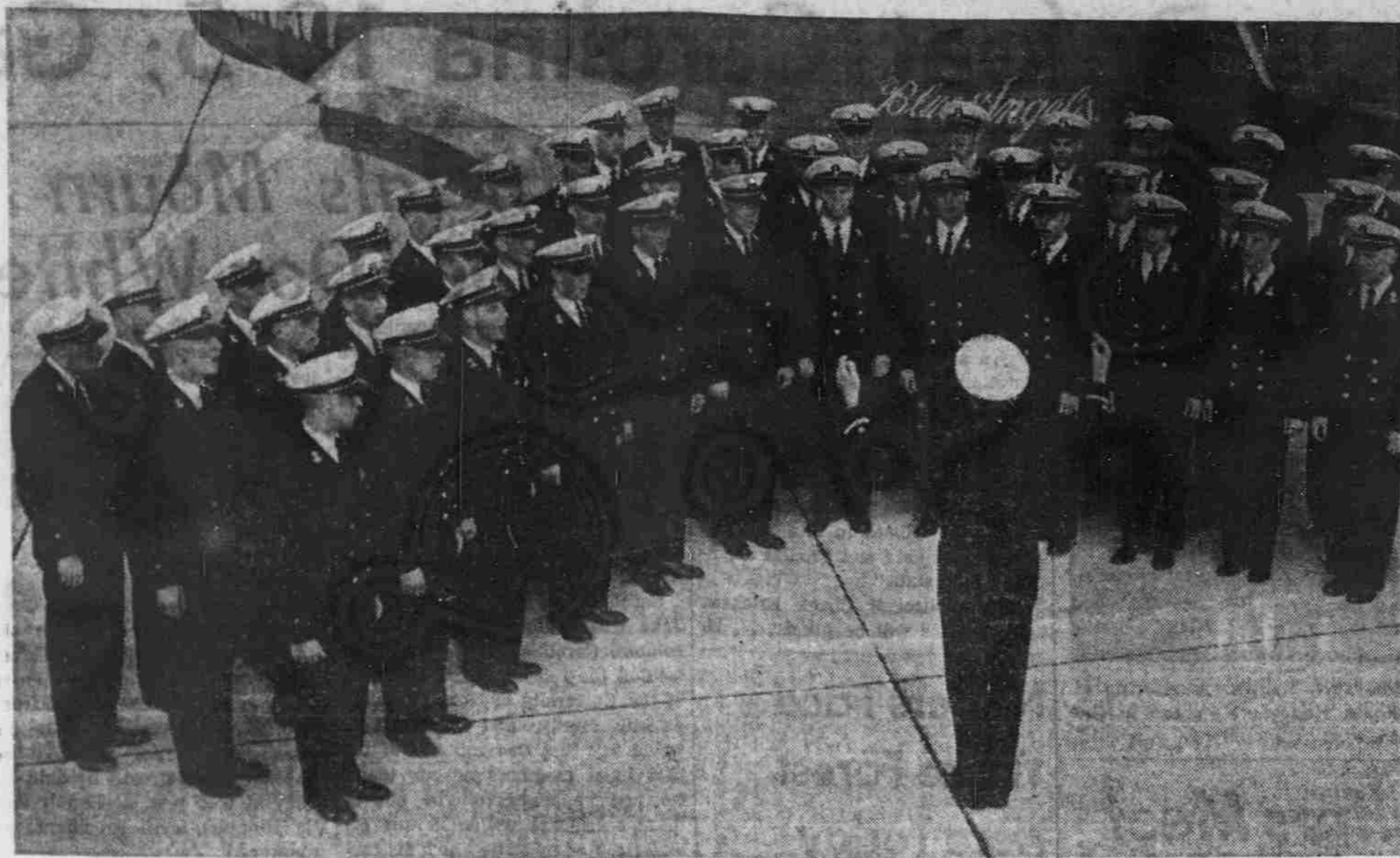
"To plan the initial steps will require the president's co-ordinated work with the proper student government, faculty and administrative officials.

"Normally the president of the student body has the period from the latter part of March until the beginning of examinations in which to hold interviews for the many student government positions, make his appointments, select the summer school president, lay the groundwork for his programs, complete the past year's activities, and mold the four executive positions into a working team.

"This year, because of the run-off and the spring vacation, the president will find himself with barely a month in which to perform the necessary duties. He will not be able to spend valuable time in acquainting himself with his tasks and with the means by which he must solve his problems.

"I believe that the opportunities that I have had to serve in various phases of student government during the past three years in the student legislature, on the Graham Memorial Board of Directors, on the Honor System Commission, on the Consolidated University Student Council and especially this past year as vice president of the student body, has enabled me to gain the administrative knowledge which will make it possible for me to begin immediate work on our many student problems."

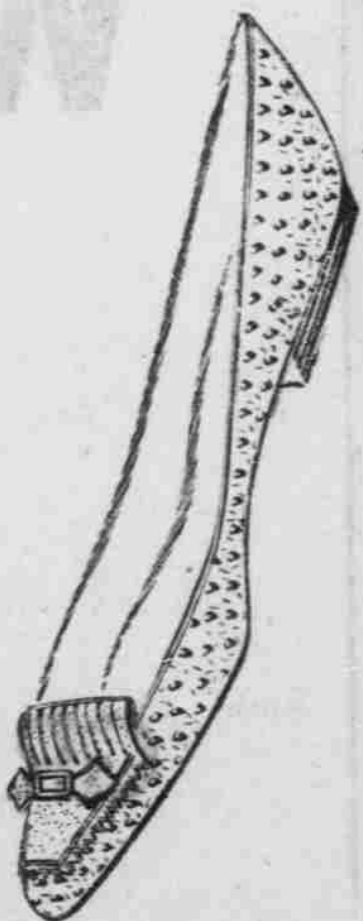
