pus the advantages of the interested supervision from which they benefited during their first two years.

"We feel that the opportunity to develop sound academic habits will be theirs within these rules."

The new rules, said the WRC, are in accordance with the previously established housing policy that all freshman women enrolled in similar programs at the University are housed together.

Therefore the Council voted unanimously to house freshman women in Spencer Dormitory.

Spencer's new wing, the WRC pointed out, is the newest "and currently the most comfortable dormitory on the campus." "In addition," the group added, "to the newest in conveniences, these women will associate with 90 juniors and seniors who will also live in this dormitory.

"In short, they are not housed separately."

The group observed that Spencer has a dining room where new freshman women may have their meals, and that the dorm is a few minutes walk from distant parts of the campus, "much nearer than many sorority houses."

Uniform rules are necessary, the WRC has agreed. "In formulation these rules a much greater degree of freedom has been accorded the 60 freshman nurses.

"I. Where previously freshman women were allowed to visit in fraternity houses Sunday dinner and until 8 on German's evening, the rule now states: Freshman students may have dinner and remain until 8 Monday thru Thursday; and on weekends until freshman closing hours.

"It has been, and will continue to be, the responsibility of the WRC, when informed of the wished and desires of those whom it represents, to consider these wishes seriously and to legislate accordingly," the council's statement concluded.

Photo Course To Include Pretty Girls

Beauty queens from North Carolina will vie with attractive models from Florida at the Southern Short Course in Press Photography at Carolina Inn April 17-19.

Hugh Morton of Wilmington, director of the course, stated that Dick Pope who is developer of Florida's famous Cypress Gardens will bring his lecture on "Thinking and Placing Publicity Pictures." Pope is two models with him in illustrating "unsurpassed as a publicity picture idea man," said Morton. "With assistance from two beautiful models, America's master picture publicist will unveil the tricks of the trade for still pictures and TV."

Two North Carolina press photographers will try to match Pope's choices by selecting beauties from this state. Roland Giduz of Chapel Hill and Charles Cooper of Durham are in charge of that phase of the program.

The Southern Short Course is sponsored by the Carolinas Press Photographers Association in cooperation with the National Press Photographers Association, and the Extension Division of the University of North Carolina. Attendance is open to anyone interested.

No Song For Elvis

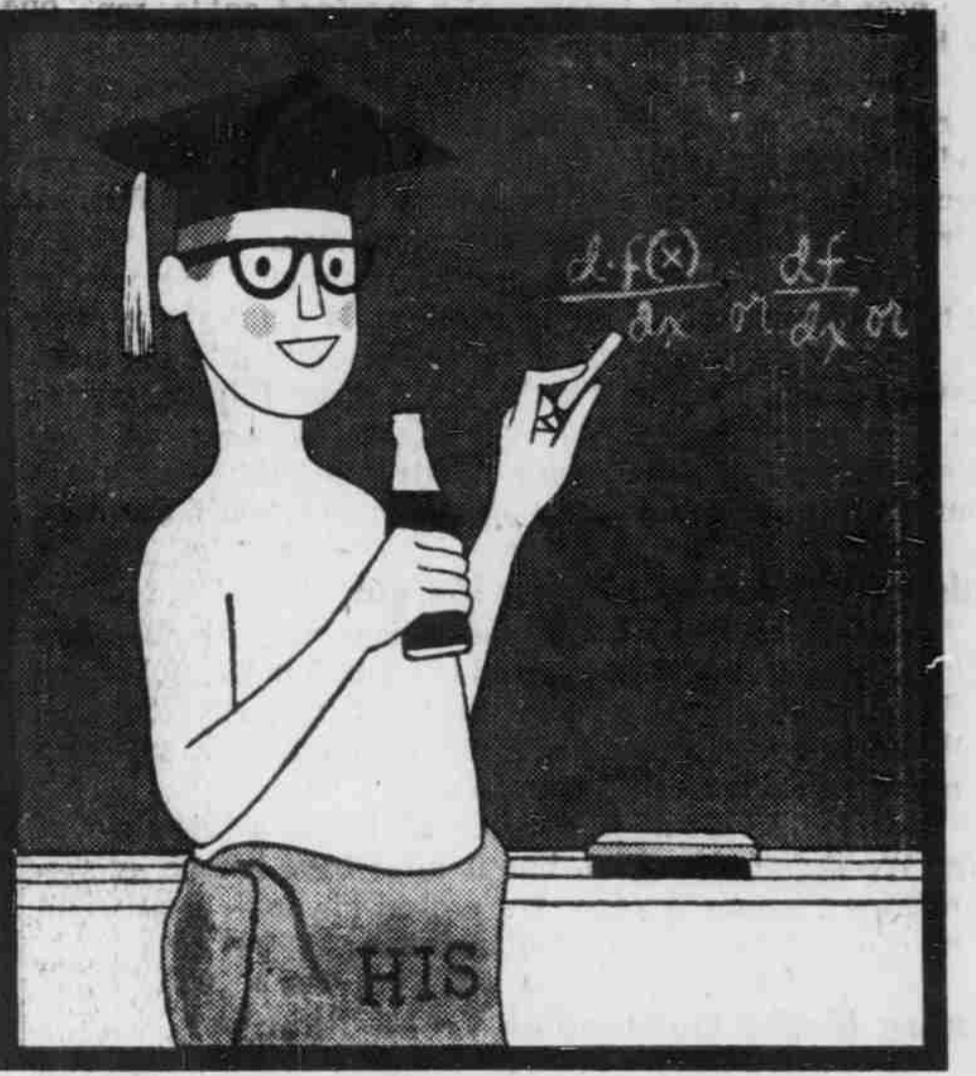
WASHINGTON, April 14 (AP)—The Army has rejected a request that Pvt. Elvis Presley be allowed to sing at an armed forces day celebration in DeLeon springs, Fla.

Rep. Herlong (D-Fla.) tried to get Presley assigned to the celebration sponsored by the De Land Fla. chamber of commerce at near-by DeLeon springs, but the army said Presley wasn't available.

Presley is getting boot training at Ft. Hood Tex.

The army advised Helong: "Pvt. Presley is currently undergoing his initial cycle of training, which is vital in preparing him for further army service. He is one of a group of recruits comprising a packet operating on a rigid and accelerated training schedule which all must complete together. It is contrary to department of the army policy to interrupt this important phase of his training except for compassionate or emergency reasons."
