In the same neighborhood are the homes of Ralph H. Scott, a brother who has served in the state senate; and Dr. Floyd Scott, another brother who lives in nearby Burlington.

Claude Teague Selected For Di-Phi Award

Claude Teague, retired business manager of the University and an alumnus of the Phi, was selected Tuesday night to receive the 1958 Di-Phi award for outstanding service to the state, nation and university.

The award will be presented next week to Teague at the Phi-Di debate. Teague, who is currently special assistant to University President William Friday, was chosen jointly by the two debating societies.

The Phi-Di debates will be held in Di Hall in New East on the topic: Resolved: That the U. S. should aid the revolutionary effort of Fidel Castro in Cuba. The Di's team of four debaters will take the affirmative viewpoint, and the Phi's group will debate the negative.

The winner of the debate will receive the trophy which the Di currently holds.

At the Phi meeting Tuesday a substitute bill introduced by Rep. Judy Huntress concerning regulations for incoming freshman coeds was tabled and will be debated again in two weeks. The bill is expected to provoke spirited discussion when it is debated Feb. 29.
