

Nine New Faculty Appointments Approved By Friday And Trustees

Three associate professors and six assistant professors have been appointed to the UNC faculty effective September 1.

Chancellor William B. Aycock announced the appointments among a number of personnel changes approved by President William C. Friday and the Board of Trustees.

Named as associate professors were Karl Ludwig Selig, Romance languages, now at Johns Hopkins University; Robert Arthur Rupen, political science, now at Bryn Mawr College; and George Brown Tindall, history, coming from Louisiana State University.

Appointed as assistant professors are Stephen B. Baxter, history; Benjamin E. Fountain Jr., education; Richard L. Frautschi, Romance languages; Richard G. Hiskey, chemistry; Paul S. Hubbard Jr., physics; and Miss Lucia Cameron Morgan, English.

Selig was also granted a leave of absence for the academic year 1958-59, in order to accept a Fulbright Grant for work in Europe. A native of Wiesbaden, Germany, he holds B. A. and M. A. degrees from Ohio State University and the Ph. D. from the University of Texas.

Tindall, a native of Greenville, S. C., received his A. B. degree at Furman University and his M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from UNC at Chapel Hill. Before going to LSU he taught at Woman's College in Greensboro, University of Mississippi and Eastern Kentucky State College.

Rupen, in addition to teaching at Bryn Mawr, has done research work at the University of Washington and at Harvard. His degrees are

the B. A., Williams College; M. A., Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy; and Ph. D., University of Washington.

Fountain is a native of Rocky Mount, where he taught and was school principal for several years. During 1953-57 he was associate executive secretary of the N. C. School Boards Association, while working toward his Ph. D. degree at Chapel Hill. He also holds the A. B. and M. Ed. from UNC.

Frautschi is now an instructor at Smith College and for two years was a teaching fellow at Harvard, where he took his M. A. and Ph. D. degrees. A native of Rockford, Ill., he took his B. A. at the University of Wisconsin.

Also a Harvard graduate with a B. A. degree, Baxter received his Ph. D. from Cambridge University in 1955. He taught for three years at Dartmouth College and is currently a visiting assistant professor at the University of Missouri.

Hiskey is currently on the faculty of Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute and serves as consultant for Mann Research Laboratories. A native of Emporia, Kansas, he holds two degrees from Kansas State College, and the Ph. D. from Wayne University, where he was a teaching assistant and fellow.

Hubbard is currently completing his Ph. D. degree at Harvard, where he also took his M. A. Originally from St. Petersburg, Fla., he did his undergraduate work at the University of Florida.

Miss Morgan, a native of Baton Rouge, holds the B. A., M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from Louisiana State University. Her teaching experience includes LSU, Michigan State, Florida State and the University of Mississippi, where she is currently an associate professor.

Raper Wins Root-Tilden Grant For Three Year Law Study At NYU

John E. Raper, Jr., of Fayetteville has received an Elihu Root-Samuel J. Tilden Scholarship for three years of study at the New York University School of Law. Recipients of the scholarships, which are valued at \$7,200 each, were announced today by Dean Russell D. Niles.

Mr. Raper will graduate in June from the University of North Carolina in Chapel Hill and will begin his law studies at NYU in September.

Root-Tilden Scholarships are awarded annually to two outstanding college men from each of the 10 federal judicial circuits. The grants are named for two famous NYU alumni.

Elihu Root (Class of 1867) served in the cabinets of William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt. Samuel J. Tilden (Class of 1814) was governor of New York and unsuccessful candidate for the presidency against Rutherford B. Hayes.

The other Root-Tilden recipient from that circuit is Larry W. Childers of Rock Hill, South Carolina, a senior at Providence College in Providence, Rhode Island.

Mr. Raper graduated from Fayetteville Senior High School, where he was senior speaker at commencement and received the Danforth Foundation and Outstanding Key Clubber awards.

At Carolina he is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, national honor society, and Beta Theta Pi, social fraternity. He also is chairman of the Carolina Symposium Committee, a member of the Graham Memorial Activities Board, and a member of the University's soccer team.

The New York University School of Law was founded in 1835. Located on historic Washington Square in New York's Greenwich Village, it has an enrollment of more than 700 day and evening students.

Nash Delivers Baccalaureate At Stephens

Prof. Arnold S. Nash of the Department of Religion will deliver this year's baccalaureate address at Stephens College in Columbia, Mo. As a main speaker at the commencement exercises on May 25, Dr. Nash will speak on "The Tragic Sense of Life."

A member of the UNC faculty since 1947, Nash is professor of the history of religion, and formerly chairman of the Religion Department. A native of England, he was educated at the University of Liverpool and the University of London.

French Review Prints Article By H. K. Russell

An article by H. K. Russell, Carolina English professor, has been published in a special issue of the French literary magazine, La Revue des Lettres Modernes. The article deals with the works of Ernest Hemingway.

The article, "The Catharsis in A Farewell To Arms," was first published in Modern Fiction Studies. The editor of La Revue des Lettres Modernes requested a number of articles on Hemingway to be translated and reprinted in the French publication. Dr. Russell's article was among those used.

The purpose of La Revue is to put before its reading public the new ideas of modern literature. The current issues of the magazine are devoted to critical discussion of themes and creations of modern writers. In addition to the number concentrating on Hemingway there have been publications dealing with William Faulkner, John Dos Passos, Walt Whitman and others.

A member of the UNC faculty since 1929, Dr. Russell is interested in contemporary English and American fiction. Before coming to UNC, he taught in the American University at Beirut, Lebanon.

Heron Wins Coker Award At Banquet
