As UNC Intern

The Danforth Foundation has assigned John D. Roth as Seminary Intern to the University of North Carolina for 1958-59.

In this post Roth will work with various religious groups at the University, including the YMCA-YWCA, the Westminster Fellowship and the Wesley Foundation. He will occupy an office on the second floor of the YMCA building and will live at the Wesley Foundation. His supervisor will be Sam Magill, assistant dean of Student Affairs.

Roth did his undergraduate work at Bowling Green State University in Ohio, where he obtained a B. A. degree in history. At Bowling Green he was president of the United Christian Fellowship, a member of Omicron Delta Kappa (honorary leadership society) and Theta Chi social fraternity.

Roth has completed his second year at the Boston University School of Theology and is preparing to enter campus ministry.

The Danforth Seminary Internship Program is designed to provide a learning experience in campus religious work for a selected group of theological students who have completed two years toward their degree.

**Furtado Makes
Two Requests
For Opener**

Student Body President Don Furtado has called on all UNC and State College students to observe two requests at the opening game Saturday:

"1. Do not take part in any acts of vandalism.

"2. If our team happens to be the loser, please stay off of the playing field. It has been agreed that the goalposts are the property of the victors."

Furtado made the statement after a meeting here last week of several student officials from both schools. The group met to "discuss means" of keeping the rivalry "on a healthy and friendly basis."

The two requests, he said, "especially apply to the Carolina student, for under our Campus Code we are obligated to conduct ourselves as gentlemen and ladies at all times.

He said by so doing UNC will win the Atlantic Coast Conference Sportswriters Student Sportsmanship Trophy.

"Duke won last year. We cannot let that happen again," he concluded.

The two students and two administrative officials agreed that opening the social rooms would be especially desirable, since a large number of students from Woman's College will be here this weekend.

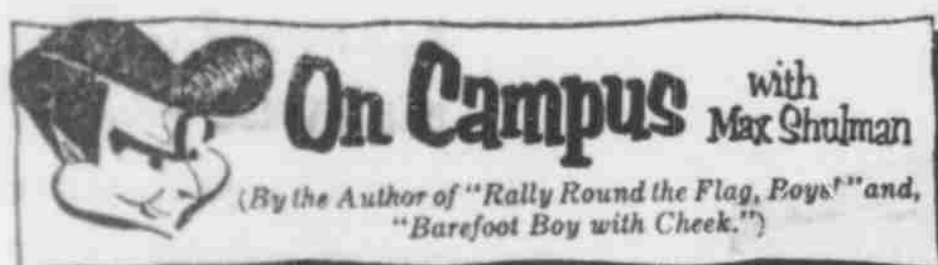
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ONCE MORE UNTO THE BREACH
