

# Reds' Blockade Broken By Nationalist Convoy

TAIPEI, Formosa — A Nationalist military headquarters here refused to say how many landing ships made it to the shell raked beach of the offshore island. But headquarters said Red shore batteries had pumped 2,435 shells onto Quemoy up to mid-afternoon.

Nationalist fighter planes flying protective cover for the supply convoy were challenged by a formation of Communist MIG17s. The Nationalist fighters broke off contact without firing, they reported.

# First Meeting For Glee Club To Be Monday

Miss Beviis, who was named instructor in medical-surgical nursing, is a graduate of the Emory University School of Nursing, received the M. A. in nursing education from the University of Chicago.

# 'Most Popular' Shows Slated For Planetarium

The schedule of programs for the tenth anniversary year, beginning September 30, at the Morehead Planetarium on the University of North Carolina campus here has been announced by Manager A. F. Jenzano.

"We have included in the schedule the most popular programs presented since the Planetarium opened in May, 1949," Jenzano said, "and have continued our policy of presenting timely programs coinciding with world events and phenomena in the skies."

## PERENNIAL FAVORITES

Expanded and up-dated over the years, the 1958-59 programs will include the perennial favorites "Star of Bethlehem," which will start November 25; "Easter, the Awakening," which will start February 24; and the customary summer trip show to outer space, this time "A Trip to the Moon," to take off next June 30.

At the conclusion of "Land, Sea and Sky," the now-running tribute to the International Geophysical Year, two timely programs will launch the Tenth Anniversary schedule.

## OPENING SHOWS

They will be "Autumn Constellations," beginning September 30, followed by "Mysteries of Mars," starting October 21. Another will be "In the Beginning," which will start next May 12. It will be a nostalgic demonstration akin to the initial Planetarium program in 1949 entitled "Let There Be Light."

Other scheduled offerings will include "Scouting the Skies," January 6-February 23, in cooperation with the Boy Scouts of America national study theme. Complementing it will be a basic astronomy

program directed to children in primary grades, entitled "Sun, Moon, Earth." It will begin January 11. "Color in the Sky" will open on April 7.

Another permanent exhibit will be unveiled during the year. Tentatively scheduled for November, it will be a 15' x 34' authentic HO-scale model railroad, complete with landscaping, and will be demonstrated at appointed hours.

From Dec. 2 through March 4, a model of the Vanguard Rocket will be on public display in addition to the regular art and science exhibits. All of the public programs, which will be given every evening and at weekend matinees, will be presented in appropriate form to school children with reservations in the mornings and afternoons during the scholastic year.

## MATINEE INCREASE

During sessions of the General Assembly, the number of week day matinees will be increased to accommodate the large number of children who biennially visit Raleigh and the University campus.

In addition and on request, the Planetarium will arrange for high school groups to make conducted tours of University departments. They include the Air Force ROTC, Botany, Chemistry, Classics, Geology and Geography, Music, Naval Science, Pharmacy, Physical Education and Athletics, and Television.

Simultaneous with today's announcement of the list of programs, more than 10,000 schedules were put into the mails for school officials, clergymen and regular patrons. Copies of the programs will be sent to anyone on request, Jenzano said,

# Physics Dept. Astronomers Aid Rocky Mt.

Directors of the Rocky Mount Children's Museum have good ideas for developing the Spitz Planetarium in this age of outer space, and the UNC Dept. of Physics is lending trained astronomers to help.

Four Rocky Mount enthusiasts—all amateur astronomers—came to Chapel Hill last week and talked with Professor Everett D. Palmatier, Lecturer and expert in cosmic rays. Dr. Palmatier is chairman of the Dept. of Physics and director of the University's Division of Natural Sciences.

With the aid of Harvey Daniell, astronomer and lecturer in the Dept. of Physics, Palmatier showed the Rocky Mount people how they can best arrange programs that will be attractive and instructive to a large number of children who come to the Children's Museum on the banks of the Tar River.

The Spitz Planetarium is one of many small planetaria operated over the country.

The Rocky Mount group expects to arrange also for parties of youngsters to come to Chapel Hill for shows at the large Morehead Planetarium here.

Daniell helped the Rocky Mount group plan programs from September to February, 1959.

The delegation from Rocky Mount included Miss Mae Bell, director of the Children's Museum; William Joyner, a representative of the Rocky Mount Kiwanis Club, which gave the Spitz Planetarium; Harold Minges, a director of the museum; and George Wyatt, amateur astronomer who wired the planetarium and helps arrange technical phases of the operation.

Garland Kincheloe is president of the Rocky Mount Museum Assn.

# Claude George Assistant Dean Of BA School

Dr. Claude S. George Jr. has been named assistant dean of the School of Business Administration.
