Dr. Tillich To Speak Twice

Dr. Paul Tillich, Harvard University professor, theologian and writer, will present two lectures here this week under the sponsorship of the Wesley Foundation.

The lectures will be delivered in Hill Hall at 8 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 3 and 4. His first lecture is entitled "The Present Encounter of Religious and Secular Faiths."

A native of Germany, Dr. Tillich served for four years as chaplain to the German army during World War I. During the interim between wars, he taught at the universities of Berlin, Dresden, Leipzig, Frankfurt and Halle.

A leader in the Christian Socialist Party in Germany at the time of World War II, Dr. Tillich was forced by Hitler to leave the country.

try. He came to Union Theological Seminary in New York to teach and also began conducting seminars in philosophy at Columbia University.

In 1955 Dr. Tillich accepted an invitation to join the faculty of Harvard and was named to one of Harvard's six distinguished service professorships. Since the end of World War II, Professor Tillich has returned several times to his native Germany to teach in some of the leading universities.

During the summer of 1956 he taught at the University of Hamburg and at the University of Berlin. He is the author of several books published in Germany on philosophy and the philosophy of religion that were written before his coming to America which have been translated into Italian, Dutch and Japanese.

He is currently writing the third and final volume of his life work, "Systematic Theology." During the past 10 years his other writings include "The Protestant Era," "The Shaking of the Foundations," "The New Being," "Love, Power and Justice," "Biblical Religion and Ultimate Reality," "Dynamics of Faith" and "The Courage To Be."

Dr. Tillich has been recognized for his contributions to the field of theology and philosophy by many scholars and writers in leading magazines. An article in Newsweek stated about Dr. Tillich: "He is now by every consensus, the great philosopher-theologian of modern U. S. Protestantism, and the idol of thousands of thinking ministers."

Paul Arnold Hickfang of the music faculty at East Carolina College, Greenville, is recent winner of the North Carolina Symphony Society's annual auditions. He will appear as guest soloist with the orchestra during its coming season.

Otis Lambert Jr. of Fayetteville, was selected as alternate. Hickfang, a bass baritone, and Lambert, a basso cantante, were chosen from a field of 11 musicians from North Carolina and Virginia, according to Dr. Benjamin Swalin, director of the N. C. Symphony.

Judges for the auditions held in Greensboro were Phillip Morgan and George Dickleson of the Woman's College School of Music; Fletcher Moore, and John Westmoreland of the Elon College Music Department; Richard Cox of the Department of Music at High Point College; Paul Peterson of the Salem College Music Department; and Gene Strassler of the UNC Music Department.

A graduate of the University of Texas and the University of Michigan, Hickfang was the recipient of a Fulbright Scholarship to Germany in 1955.
