Education Conference Is Today

The Annual Reading Conference, sponsored by the School of Education, will be held on April 10 and 11. The Conference theme is "Testing and Appraisal in the Reading Program."

Dr. Paul C. Berg, Director of the Reading Clinic of the University of South Carolina, will begin the Conference with an address at 8:00 Friday evening using the topic, "Testing and Appraisal of Achievement in Reading." On Saturday morning from 9:30 to 11:00, discussion groups will consider the use of achievement tests, mental tests, diagnostic tests, and informal appraisal techniques in a reading program.

Discussion leaders will be Dr. David Shepherd, Charlotte Reading Clinic, and Dr. Roy Sommerfeld, Dr. Annie Lee Jones, and Dr. Thelma Gwynn Thurstone, University of North Carolina School of Education. Dr. Berg will close the conference with an address scheduled at 11:15 on Saturday, using the topic, "Diagnostic Testing and Appraisal in the Reading Program."

Several hundred public school administrators, supervisors, and teachers are expected in attendance at the Conference.

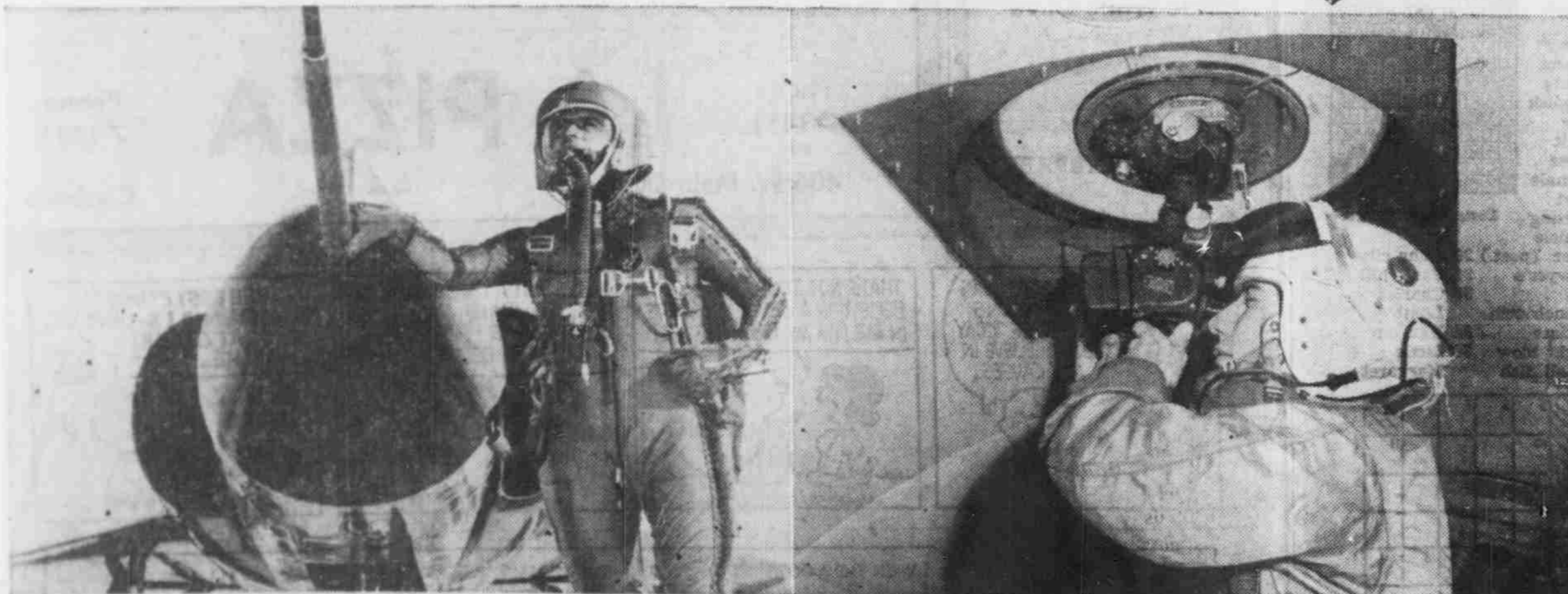
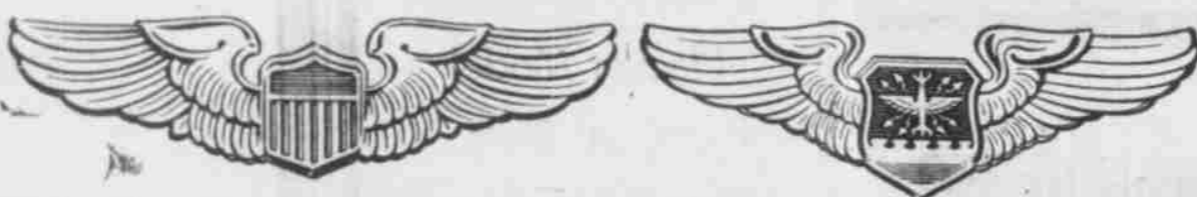
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The likelihood of an increase in student fees being necessary in the near future.

In other business the Legislature passed Ann Harvey's bill to change the method of selecting jurors for Honor Council cases. 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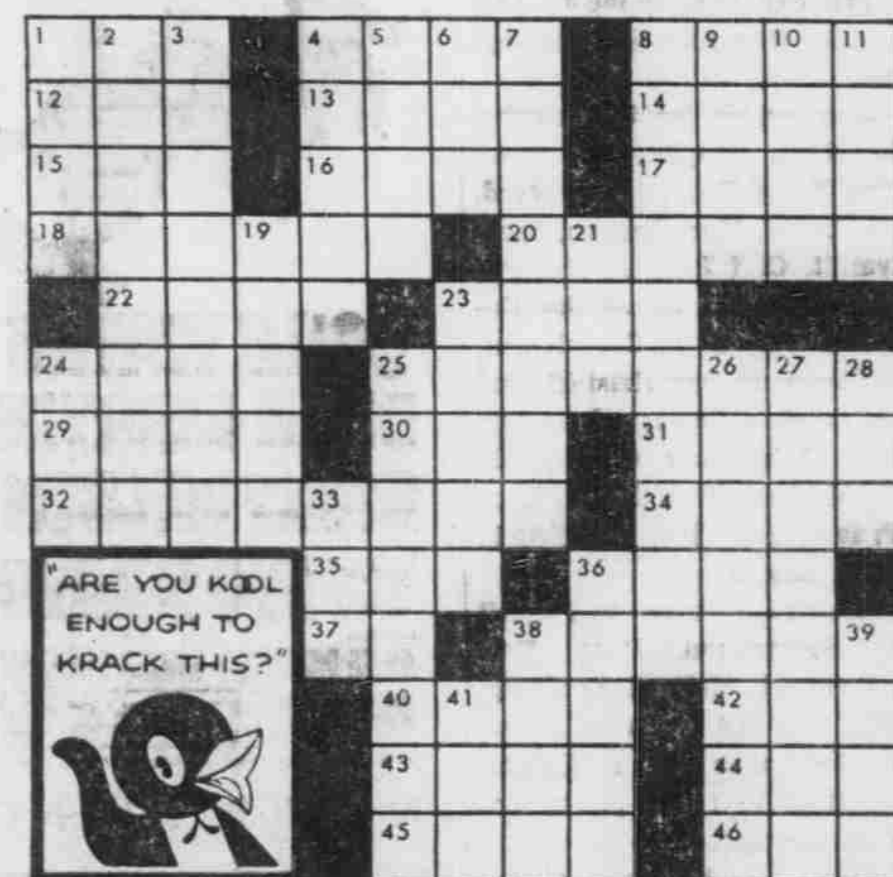
