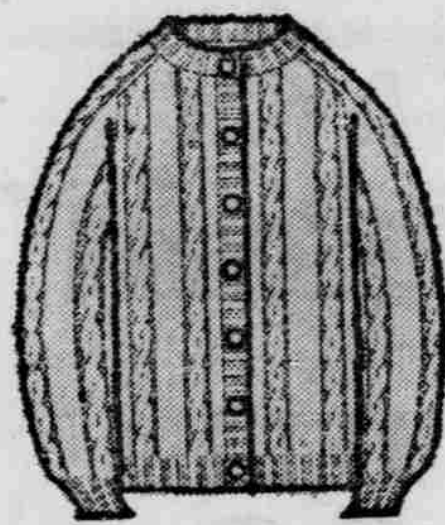

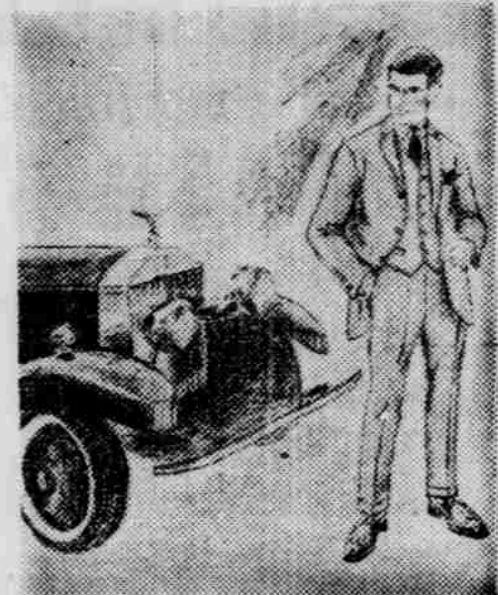


Barnes Writes Wrestling Book

Bob Zupke, the great University of Illinois football coach of yesteryear, was able to reach not only college athletes but youngsters all over the world with his deft cartooning. Dr. Sam G. Barnes of UNC falls into the same category.

Dr. Barnes, professor of English literature and wrestling coach at Carolina, is now displaying the book he authored entitled, "Ready, Wrestle." His publishers define it as a "first" of its kind in the juvenile market.

The book, in the Frank Merrill tradition, follows the progress of a young athlete who excels for his school. Many such yarns have been dedicated to football, basketball and baseball, but wrestling was a neglected sport until Dr. Barnes produced his manuscript.

Chances are good the wrestling fiction will reach a worldwide market. The story is exciting, well-paced and easily understood. A glossary of wrestling terms aids the unfamiliar reader.

A graduate of Oklahoma A. & M., with a B.S. degree in 1936, Barnes twice participated in the Olympic trials. His approach as a college wrestling coach is hard work, spiced with fun. His humor adds much

to relieve rough sessions on the mat.

Writing comes easy to Dr. Barnes, a professor of English at Carolina. He served as a reporter for the Stillwater (Okla.) Daily Press in his early years.

His experience in the wrestling field covers a period of more than 20 years. Barnes' first major post was head wrestling coach at VMI, where he served four years before entering service with the Navy and seeing action in the Pacific.

In 1946, he returned to VMI for another four seasons. During this era he also taught English at nearby Washington & Lee.

In 1950, Coach Barnes joined the faculty at North Carolina, obtaining his Master's and Doctor's degrees. English literature and wrestling serve a double purpose in his life.

Last season, during which he was installed as President of the Wrestling Coaches Association of America, Dr. Barnes' team finished second in the ACC.

He is married and the father of four sons, two of them whom practice with the Carolina team.

FCA Hears Jeffrey, Shinnick

"We must see where we are going and what method we are using to get there... With faith in ourselves and in the words of Christ the path will be clear." Fellowship of Christian Athletes Executive Director James Jeffrey told an audience of 350 at the FCA Rally in Memorial Hall Wednesday night.

Jeffrey, Baltimore Colt linebacker Don Shinnick, former

UNC athlete Albert Long and Carolina FCA president Harrison Merrill were the featured speakers on the program designed to explain the meaning of Christianity in an athlete's life.

Merrill opened the program and introduced Long, the last four - sport letter winner at UNC, who in turn introduced Shinnick.

After telling some humorous introductory stories, the big linebacker related the meaning of Christianity to his life and to those of his teammates. He told a story of a discussion

among about 25 of his fellow Colts on the meaning of the word Christian, and explained although many of us carry out many acts required of a Christian we fail to see Christ as the cornerstone of the faith.

Al Long spoke briefly and introduced Jeffrey, who after giving a juggling exhibition, spoke on the importance of having justified faith in oneself and the special meaning Christianity can have to an athlete.

All in attendance were invited to talk with Shinnick and Jeffrey afterwards.
