## Forum Gets First In Meet At Yale

NEW HAVEN (AP) - Rick Forum became the first North Carolina swimmer to take a first in the 1965 Eastern Seaboard College Swimming Championships by capturing the 200yard breastroke with a time of 2:18.4. Friday.

The Tar Heels were in third place going into yesterday's action, with a total of 102 points. Harrison Merrill and Fred Lipp both took third places. Merrill did it in the 200 - yard freestyle while Lipp placed in the 200 - yard butterfly.

Jack Hayden took an eighth in the 200 - yard backstroke and Steve Hildenbrand was 11th in the 200 individual medley.

Highlighting Friday's action was Yale's Ed Towsend's breaking of the 200 - yard individual medley record with a time of 2:02.1. He broke the old mark of 2:03.8 by Harvard's Bob Kaufman in 1961, which was the oldest standing Eastern Seabord record.

Another Eli, Olympian Steve Clark, successfully defended his 200 - yard freestyle title in 1:45.1 to match it with the 50-

vard sprint crown he captured Thursday night.

Six of Maryland's ACC Championship grapplers are paid for their mat work, and most other conference schools give scholarships. But Carolina begins practice each year with fingers crossed, and the result is that Tar Heels wrestling fluctuates from good to bad and we have yet to get our backs off the mat yet against the Terps.

This year was one of the bad ones. "It has been a strange season," Barnes remarked. "We were very unbalanced with some strong weight divisions and many weak ones. The other teams geared their strategy accordingly and just hit at it. It is hard to go out knowing we will be giving away 14 points a match. The boys work hard, but we were short on confidence."

Despite the loss of four seniors - Russ Simmons, Ken Furr. Dave Wiles and Elliott Dworin - the outlook is bright for next year.


