Heart Institute Approves Grant To Study Breathing

UNC is due to get a five-year vival. M a n y patients with acute lung problems need help grant to use computers to study the human body during breathing. The \$91,000 award was approved by the National Heart Institute. The research could be signif-

icant in the treatment of patients with lung disorders and in the care of patients during and after chest surgery. Project director is Dr. Richard M. Peters, professor of surgery in charge of chest surgery and co-director of the

Clinical Heart - Lung Labora-tory at the School of Medicine. With computer techniques devised in laboratories here, a research team will seek a better understanding of the amount of work a person must do to breathe. Such work is of great importance in the comfort of sick patients and often in their sur-
