AN OPEN LETTER TO FRANK MCGUIRE

Mr. Frank McGuire Head Basketball Coach University of South Carolina Columbia, S. C.

Dear Frank:

I have followed with interest the developments in the Mike Grosse case, concerning his eligibility to play basketball in the Atlantic Coast Conference, because I am deeply interested in that conference and its future.

I am not concerned with the question that has been raised concerning Mike. That is for others, not I, to decide. Suffice it to say that I understand he is a basketball player of exceptional ability, one who may be the difference between a winning and a losing season for you. For that reason, I am sorry the whole affair started. I know how much you like to win.

I am sorry, though, that this had to happen. You had trouble when you were at North Carolina, I understand. An NC AA investigation of your recruiting practices here found them to be "excessive," and you admitted it. Then, a couple of your recruits were involved in the point-shaving scandals that rocked the ACC a few years ago. You left the ACC, and, for a while at least things ran along smoothly. Now, you have come home again.

Now, things are not so smooth.

I'm sure it's not your iault. Frank. I know that "they are out to get you. You even said so. And I do not believe all

those stories I hear about your method of producing winning basketball teams. I do not be-

lieve them because I dislike unsavory stories. Some people think there is a direct relationship between Frank Mc-Guire and trouble. I wouldn't like to believe that, either, Air Force Academy.

but. . . The national sports publication reporter you talked with last week made one correct statement in his article, Frank. He said something about the




