"I think it would be unwise. If we had them (no closing hours), people would generally come in earlier."

"I wouldn't be in favor of it. The average Carolina coed isn't responsible enough not to have any restrictions." Of the girls questioned 40 per

cent favored closing hours for all women; 28.9 per cent preferred no closing hours for any women; 13.3 per cent thought seniors, graduate students, and any others twenty - one or older should not have closing hours but that all other women students should have them; 8.9 per cent favored closing hours for freshmen women only; 4.4 per cent were indifferent or had no definite opinion on the subject; 2.2 per cent thought juniors, seniors, and grad students should not have closing hours; and 2.2 per cent thought that only grad students should not have clos-

ing hours. The president of one dorm stated: "The Faculty Committee on Student Discipline says, and I quote, 'There shall be closing hours for women.' Right now there's just no way
