Duke Prof To Speak About Law, Vietnam

"Vietnam, Legal Aspects" will be the topic of a speech today to the John J. Parker International Law Society.

Halderman has worked with the American legations in Bonn, Berlin, Casablanca and Colombo. He attended the 1945 United Nations Conference on International Organization and was connected with the State Department from 1959-60.

Oxford Archaeologist To Speak Monday

Oxford University archaeologist Dr. Martin J. Aitken will speak before a special UNC seminar Monday at 4 p.m. in 215 Phillips Hall.

Dr. Aitken's talk, sponsored by the N. C. Society of the Archaeological Institute of America and the UNC Physics Dept., will be on thermoluminescent dating of archaeological pottery.

Islamic Art Display Begins At Ackland

"Islamic Art from the Collection of Edwin Binney III" will be on view at the Ackland Art Center Nov. 5-30.

Although, the opportunities to acquire Near Eastern and Indian miniature paintings have become increasingly rare since the end of World War II, Binney has since 1968 built one of this country's outstanding private collections.

Sixty-seven miniatures and calligraphic fragments from this collection, together with manuscripts, manuscript bindings, ceramics and metalwork comprise the exhibition.

Allan Ashman, an authority on correctional law and also an Institute assistant director, will close the Friday afternoon session with a discussion of "Jail Reform and the News Media."

At 7 p.m. banquet at the Holiday Inn will be followed by a panel discussion of "The Relationship of the Courts and the News Media."

The seminar will close with a discussion of "The Law of Libel and Its Importance to the News Media."
