A UNC Chi Phi basketball team beat a University of Florida quintet 71-64 in Atlanta Sunday to win the Southeastern Chi Phi regional basketball tournament.

UNC's Mike Benton, who scored 45 points in the tourney, was awarded the Rankin Smith Award for Most Valuable Player.

UNC's Chi Phi beat the Auburn frat, 70-34 in its first game and Georgia 49-44 in the semifinals.

Benton was the top scorer for UNC against Florida with 23 points—Dave Hardy netted 20 points, Bill Smith 12, Ben Booker, 6, John Roberts, 6, and Ron Johnson 4.

The Carolina Chi Phi's placed second in the tournament last year behind Florida.

Teams from Georgia Tech, Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, University of Tennessee, Florida State University, Florida Institute of Technology, and Emory competed in the tournament.

The Tar Heel fencers remained undefeated with two victories Saturday over Vanderbilt and Duke.

Carolina upped its record to 6-0 with an 18-9 win over Vandy and a 15-12 edging of Duke.

The sabre and epee teams overwhelmed the Commodores in the first match with identical 8-1 wins. The foils team met opposite success, however, getting only two victories in nine bouts.

Duke proved more formidable. The foilsmen improved with a 4-5 record although the epee squad faltered at the start and finished with a 5-4 mark. The sabremen continued their earlier success with six wins against three setbacks.

Epeemen John DeVane (6-0)

and Dick Wilson (3-0) took honors for Carolina with no defeats for the day. Ben Brinson (2-2) and Jeff McKay (2-3) were other UNC competitors in the epee.

Tom Ruff and Chuck Schumacher both 3-3, won clutch foil bouts for the Heels after slow starts. George Schleck and Dan Kolstrud were other Carolina foilsmen.

The sabre team, which had a combined 14-4 record, all did well.

Pete Kent (3-0), Peter Batke (5-1) and Dick Betts (4-1) led the sabremen while Carl Thompson split his four matches.

The fencers face Virginia and VMI in their next matches Saturday.
