

# Traditional Powers Win In Fraternity Blue Play

## Federal Grant Finances Survey

A federal grant will make it possible for UNC to conduct a survey of all of its physical therapy graduates, to review the course of study here for physical therapists and to preview the educational needs

of future physical therapists. The curriculum study and development project by the Division of Physical Therapy at the UNC School of Medicine will be financed by a \$14,500 grant from the Social Rehabilitation Services Division of the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The grant will finance the first year of a proposed three-

year study. "The composite information from our study will be used to prepare major revisions in the curriculum to be implemented in 1969," explained Miss Charlene Nelson, assistant professor of physical therapy and project director.

She said a major part of the project will be visits and interviews at other health facilities in the U.S. to learn how physical therapists are being prepared educationally.

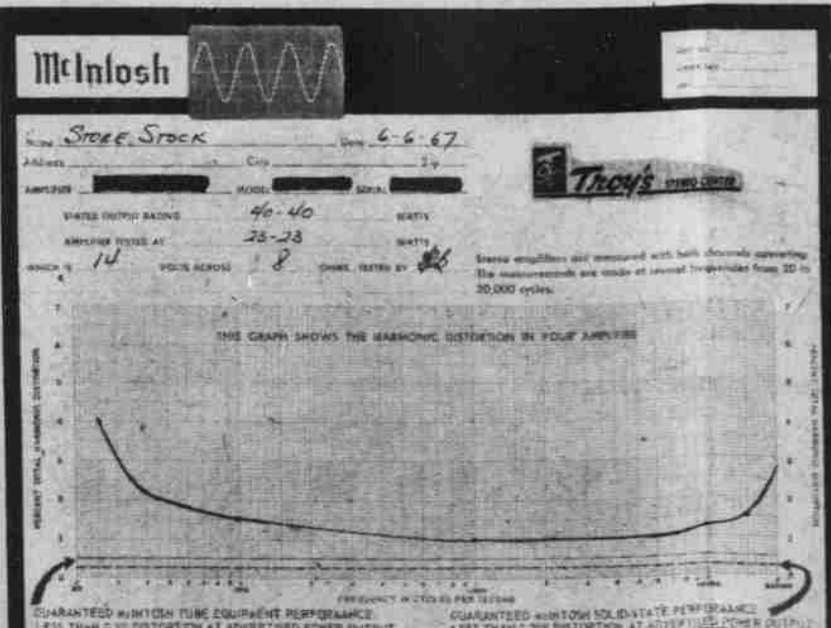
