Maryland Comeback Nips State, Carolina Terrapins Rally To Win Swimming

Maryland came from behind to defeat North Carolina State and win the Atlantic Coast Conference swimming championship, yesterday.

The Terrapins finished with 460 points to the Wolfpack's 452. Coach Pat Earey's Carolina squad was third with 399 points, while South Carolina, Virginia, Wake Forest, Duke and Clemson were the next finishers.

State's Steve McGrain started the day by winning the 1000-yard freestyle, as Dolphin swimmers Gerry Chapman and Frank McElroy won the second and fourth spots.

Eric Schwall of the

Wolfpack repeated as 100-yard freestyle champion with a time of :17.8, and UNC's Bruce Wigo finished fifth. Butch Bristow won the consolation.

State continued to dominate as Tom Evans won his second straight 200-yard backstroke championship. Mike Darst was third for the Tar Heels, who also got first and second place finishes from Rich Williams and Bob Pollard in the consolation.

Maryland, however, captured the lead, 390-381, with a tremendous performance in the 200-yard backstroke. Terrapin swimmers took first, second, and fourth place in the championship finals, limiting State to a third. Dough Wilson of Carolina

finished sixth. The Terps followed by grabbing the first two places in the 100-yard butterfly to practically wrap up the meet.

John Thoder of USC won the 3-meter diving, edging State's Randy Horton. Chuck Humphrey, the Blue Dolphins only entry, was fifth.

State took the 400-yard freestyle relay, as Maryland and North Carolina finished second and third, but it wasn't enough to defeat the champion Terps.

The Wolfpack had taken a commanding lead in the Friday night finals, with 294 points to Maryland's 266 and Carolina's 260. The other five teams lagged far behind.

John Long of State successfully defended his title in the 200-yard butterfly, edging UNC's Dave Bedell with a time of 1:56.4. Frank McElroy was sixth.

The Blue Dolphins were shut out of the 200-yard freestyle championship final, which was won by Maryland's Gary Gooden, but Bob Nagle, Bruce Wigo and Bill Herndon finished 205-6 in the consolation.

Tar Heel Doug Wilson won the 100-yard breaststroke consolation final, and teammate Bob Pollard got fourth place. In the finals Maryland's Tim Schaeberle triumphed, while UNC's Rich Williams finished sixth.

Mike Darst lost the 100-yard backstroke title to State's defending champ, Tom Evans, by .06 seconds. Other Tar Heel point winners were Phil McMungal, fifth in the championships, and Butch Bristow, second in the consolation.

Gerry Chapman won the 400-yard individual medley championship, and Williams took fifth. In the consolation final, Rick Hood and John Lindahl finished 3-5.

Carolina's 800-yard freestyle relay team finished second to the Wolfpack quartet that turned in a time of 7:11.6.

Tar Babies Edged By Duke Imps

Carolina dropped its final game of the season Friday night, a 45-37 slowdown match with the Duke Blue Imps.

A raucous crowd of 5,000 cheered the first undefeated freshmen team in Duke's history, but the controlled tempo game plan of the Tar Babies came quite close to spoiling the unblemished record.

Carolina opened with its four corners offense, a tactic which despite its frequent use still confuses opponents.

The return of 6-8 Donn Johnston to the Tar Baby line-up and the deadly shooting of Norris Crigler sent the Carolina quintet to a 10-3 lead five minutes into the first half. But the Blue Imps Gary

Melchionni led a Duke comeback to tie the score at ten points apiece with 11:15 in the half.

The battle swayed back and forth between the two combatants from that point until the halftime buzzer, with Duke barely on top at intermission 26-25.

The second half saw the slowdown tactics used to their fullest extent. Carolina controlled the second half tap and immediately settled into the four corners. Duke didn't

contest the plan until four minutes had ticked off the clock.

The Blue Imps came out

with 16 minutes to play, and their pressure defense forced Tar Baby turnovers which gave the Dukes a 32-26 lead with 14:36 to play.

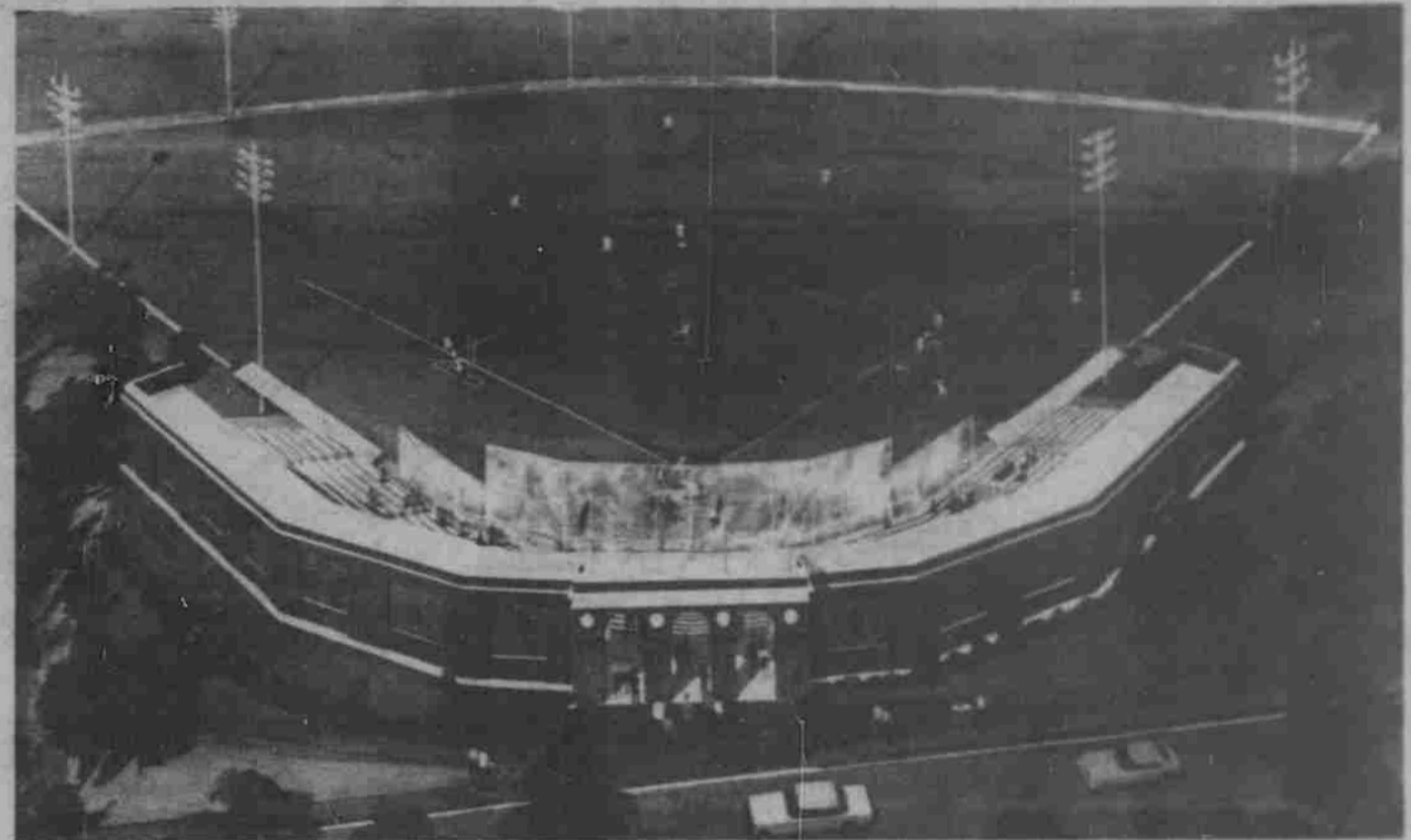
At this stage in the action (or inaction if the stall is considered) Duke held the ball. Melchionni passed the ball to his teammates at mid-court to provide excitement for the home crowd, as other Duke players strolled to their bench from time to time to chat with their coach.

For ten and one half minutes the Blue Imps kept the ball to themselves with little reactions coming from the Tar Baby defenders. With four

minutes to play Melchionni drove the lane for a jumper and an eight point lead. The tempo picked up, but with the Imps hitting 100 per cent from the floor in the second half, the Tar Babies could not make up the deficit.

Cold shooting again plagued the Carolina team, as they could convert only 4 of 13 shots in the second half, and 45 per cent for the game.

Ronnie Moffitt with 12 points and Crigler with 10 led Tar Baby scorers, and Johnston (still slowed by his injury) totaled nine markers (all in the first half).



Architect's Drawing Of New Baseball Facility

Baseball Stadium Is Gift Of Alumnus

The University of North Carolina Saturday announced plans for a new baseball stadium, the gift of Cary C. Boshamer, a Gastonia textile industrialist.

University Chancellor J. Carlyle Sitterson said the new facility, to be called the Cary Boshamer Stadium, will replace the old Emerson Field which was razed four years ago to make way for the University's new student union and undergraduate library.

Construction of the stadium is expected to begin next summer at the site of the present baseball diamond on Ridge Road, next to Avery Dormitory. Lighting for the stadium, also contributed by Mr. Boshamer, already is in use.

Mr. Boshamer attended the

University, Class of 1917, and played on the football team here. He long has been an avid fan of Tar Heel baseball and regularly attends games on campus.

Director of Athletics Homer Rice and Baseball Coach Walter Rabb jointly outlined plans for the new stadium. The plans call for installation of permanent seating to accommodate 2,000 fans and construction of a beautiful stadium exterior. The seats will be aluminum. The exterior will be brick.

The stadium will include dressing room facilities for home and visiting teams and coaches; an area for an indoor batting cage; rest room facilities; and a permanent working press area.

The lights were installed last summer and will be used for the first time this baseball

season. Eleven of Carolina's 18 home games this season will be played at night. Rabb says the lights are comparable to those in AAA professional parks and will provide Carolina with the best-lighted park in the area.

Chancellor Sitterson Saturday expressed his appreciation to Mr. Boshamer for the gifts. "Mr. Boshamer is one of the most loyal friends of the University," the Chancellor said. "His generosity extends to all areas of the University. The Boshamer professorship and Boshamer scholarship along with his other contributions are making possible significant advancements at the University. We are deeply grateful to him."

Rabb said that Mr. Boshamer's gifts of the stadium and lighting will provide Carolina with baseball facilities comparable to any in the United States.

"These facilities will not only have great utility," Rabb said, "but will be a beautiful addition to the campus. They will enable us to upgrade all aspects of our baseball program."

"This gift is another example of Mr. Boshamer's tremendous interest in and loyalty to the University. It is something in which all Carolina baseball people will take pride. We are deeply grateful for his wonderful generosity to the athletic program and to the University."

The present Carolina diamond, where the stadium

will be constructed, is regarded as one of the finest playing areas in the south. The diamond was first used four years ago after many seasons of action on Emerson Field. Presently, there are only a small number of temporary stands at the baseball diamond.

Mr. Boshamer currently devotes his business attention to Cary C. Boshamer, Inc., Clover Development Co., and Lkcar-Knit, Inc. He supports many educational and charitable organizations in addition to his alma mater, including Brevard College of which he is a trustee; The Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children; and the First United Methodist Church of Georgia.

Mr. Boshamer was born in Statesville, N.C., but has lived in many areas of the country, including San Francisco, Philadelphia, Chicago, Georgia, South Carolina and presently in Gastonia.

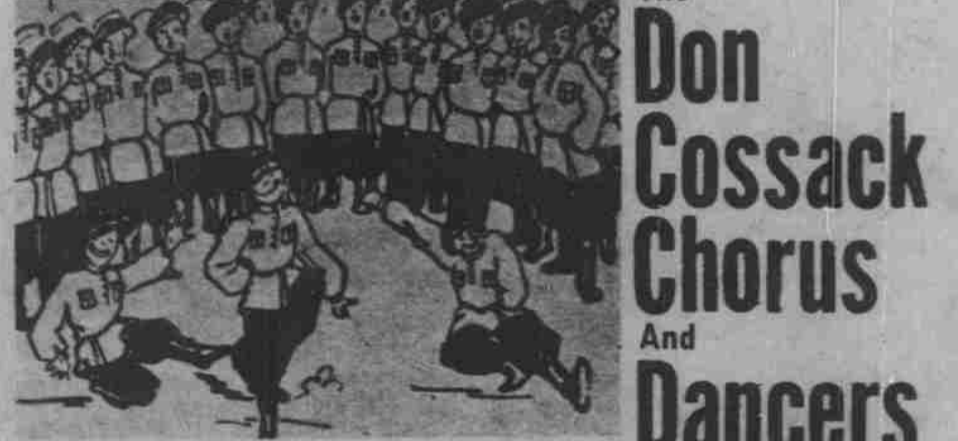
