

Cowboys sign 3 Tar Heels

Carolina football players Ricky Lanier, Ron Grzybowski and Tom Cantrell have signed as free agents with the Dallas Cowboys.

The three Tar Heel grid stars signed with the National Conference champions a few days after the National Football League draft in late January. None were selected in the 17-round draft.

Dallas is noted for acquiring numerous free agents prior to its summer training camp.

Cantrell, a guard-linebacker on this year's Peach Bowl squad, said he was "extremely pleased" to have a shot at the pro game.

"I've always liked the Cowboys," he

noted. "They play a very complex, exciting game."

Cantrell, 6-3, 230, said he will be tried at middle linebacker, offensive end and defensive end.

Grzybowski, offensive guard this past season, will seek the same slot with the Cowboys. The 6-1, 233-pound Grzybowski is slightly small for the position, but has good quickness.

Lanier, 6-1, 185, a split end for the 1970 Tar Heels, could be tried at outside receiver or defensive back.

The three professional rookies will travel to Dallas one weekend in March for physicals and seminars on the Cowboys' offense and defense.

Summer training camp will open July 12.

Several National Football League clubs contacted the three players after they signed with Dallas.

Two other Tar Heels, running back Don McCauley and tight end Tony Blanchard, were taken in the regular draft.

McCauley was a first-round selection of the NFL champion Baltimore Colts and Blanchard was a late-round pick of the Cleveland Browns.

Present and future realities haunt Deacon's McCloskey

From beginning to end, it was a painful night for Wake Forest coach Jack McCloskey.

Wednesday night's biggest disappointment was an 83-78 loss to Duke.

But McCloskey also had to watch the Deac freshmen lose to Duke 96-67, freshening bleak thoughts of next season.

Wake will lose its four best starters, including Charlie Davis. The only freshman worthy of ACC competition is Bob Dwyer, a guard who was held to ten points by the Blue Imps.

In short, McCloskey's old job at Pennsylvania must look inviting.

This year's Deacons couldn't stop

Duke center Randy Denton, who got 33 points, and Davis picked up only 19 thanks to a tough defensive job by Dick DeVenzo.

"If I had had my normal night," said Davis later, "we would have won. The loss was my fault."

Wake's other guard, Bobby Rhoads, kept Duke from a runaway by firing in 31 points, 26 in the first half. He broke his previous career high in the game's first 12 minutes.

Trapped between Denton and 6-10 Alan Shaw, Deacon center Gil McGregor scored only 10 points and fouled out.

In other conference play, South Carolina squeaked by Davidson 70-62 and Virginia took Maryland in Charlottesville 78-63.

The physical Wildcats, who roughed

up State and Wake Forest in their two other losses to ACC teams, outrebounded South Carolina 36-33 and piled up 28 fouls.

Foul shots by Kevin Joyce and John Roche expanded a 64-60 lead into the final margin.

Davidson's 36 per cent shooting percentage was chiefly accountable to John Sutter and Bryan Adrian, who together went eight for 30.

Roche led both teams with 22 points, while Joyce and Tom Owens scored 14 each.

Maryland held fearsome Bill Gerry to two points, but the balanced Cavaliers opened up a 40-26 halftime lead and cruised to their sixth ACC victory.

Frank DeWitt, one of the most improved forwards in the league, got 16 points and center Scott McCandlish chipped in 17 to lead the Cavaliers up front.

Soph guard Barry Parkhill was Virginia's high scorer, with 21; Howard White and Charley Blank led Maryland with 12 each.

Weekend action includes the North-South doubleheader in Charlotte Friday and Saturday, Duke's journey to Maryland Saturday afternoon, and the Virginia-Wake Forest clash in Winston-Salem Saturday night. Both Duke and Wake will be looking for revenge; the Deacs lost at Charlottesville 86-81 in January and Maryland whipped Duke in Durham 88-79 last weekend.

Fencers grab win

A come-from-behind win by sabreman Bo McBee over N.C. State's Manuel Garcia triggered the North Carolina fencing team to a 16-11 win over the Wolfpack on Wednesday night. With the team score tied at 6-6, McBee responded by whipping State's number fencer by a 5-4 score.

Bud Griscom followed McBee by taking an impressive 5-1 victory. These two wins provided what coach Ron Miller called "the momentum needed to shake out some early mistakes."

He added that the win was "overall

very gratifying. Revenge is always sweet to bring home, especially after losing to State in such an important meet last year."

The epee team was the single group most instrumental in the win as they compiled an overwhelming 8-1 mark for the day. This included three 5-4 wins that could have possibly gone either way.

Leading the epee-men were Ben Brinson, Chad Hilton, Jon Pavlov, and Dave Lynn, all undefeated for the day.

The scores in sabre and foil were both 4-5, with State winning both weapons. Miller noted, however, that the scores "were not indicative of the way we fenced, and were partly due to the number of substitutions we made after we had wrapped up the win."
