Cayce is subject of Purvear talk

Dr. Herbert B. Puryear will speak on "The Significance of the Edgar Cayce Story" in Carroll Hall Feb. 24 at 3 p.m.

Cayce, America's best known seer, became known in most areas of this country following publication of selections from his psychic readings by members of the medical and scientific professions. One of the books published, "Edgar Cayce, The Sleeping Prophet," by Jess Stern, sold more than two million copies.

Puryear, currently national director of Education for the Association for Research and Enlightenment (ARE), is a UNC alumnus. He received his post-doctoral research training at the National Institute of Mental Health. He has conducted research on sleep and dreams and has had special study in the area of personality theory, psychotherapy, the psychology of religion and psychical research.

Puryear has been associated with ARE since 1951. He has lectured nationally on subjects related to the 14,000 readings.
