281 seniors sign up

for commencement program

Only 281 seniors out of a class of 2,992 have signed up for caps and gowns in order to participate in this year's commencement exercises.

Danny Davis, current senior class president, expressed concern Monday over the lack of interest.

"For the first time in many years we have consolidated the baccalaureate service and the commencement exercises. Both will take place on the same day. There will be little extra time involved for the senior to receive his degree."

Both activities will fall on Sunday, May 30. The Baccalaureate service will be at 11 a.m. in Memorial Hall. The commencement exercises will follow at 7 p.m. in Kenan Stadium. In case of rain, the exercises will be moved to Carmichael.

Davis reminded seniors that a May 1 deadline does exist for the rental of caps and gowns. He emphasized that all degree candidates should be receiving a letter from the Alumni Association within the next week concerning the full schedule of commencement exercises.

The UNC News Bureau is also expected to announce the commencement speaker next week.

Transcendental meditation subject of lecture

The UNC chapter of the Students' International Meditation Society (SIMS) will sponsor an introductory lecture on transcendental meditation Wednesday in Gerrard Hall, according to campus co-ordinator Tom Davis.

The lectures, at 2 and 8 p.m., will be given by Jim and Joan Podolak, who were taught by Maharishi Mahesh Yogi, the teacher of the Beatles and other celebrities.

"The lectures are designed to promote public interest," said Davis.

"Transcendental meditation helps in your relationship with others and provides more of a sense of continuity with yourself."

Davis said the local chapter began as a result of a lecture here last summer. In September there were only four members in the society which has grown to include around 180 members.

Davis expects a membership of 200 by the end of this school year.

Davis calls the meditation system "better than drugs." "Your mind is much clearer, your personality better integrated," he says. "You can project yourself much better into the world."

Architect to present talk on planning problems

Planner's Forum, a student organization in the Department of City and Regional Planning, will host an illustrated lecture by Graham Ashworth entitled "Current Planning Problems and the Environment in England" today at 4 p.m. in 102 New East.

Ashworth, an architect-planner acknowledged in England as one of the leaders of the profession, is presently serving as executive director of the Civic Trust for the North West, a quasi-public agency dealing with the physical environment.

During his career Ashworth has worked for the London County Council, preparing a master plan for the new town of Hook, Hampshire, and a development plan for the town of Andover. He is currently involved in a study assessing existing conditions and the factors affecting the environment in Liverpool, as well as several other environmental studies.

Candidates meet for issue discussion

The League of Women Voters will sponsor a public meeting of candidates for mayor and board of aldermen of Chapel Hill at 8 p.m. today at Guy Phillips Junior High School.

The meeting, to be held in the cafeteria of the school, will begin with a discussion of the Chapel Hill-Carrboro bus system. Voters in Chapel Hill and Carrboro will vote on May 4 to decide whether to commit themselves to an additional tax levy of up to 8 cents per \$100 property evaluation to subsidize the bus system.

Terry Lathrop, chairman of the Transportation Commission, will describe the bus operation and answer questions from the audience.

Candidates for mayor-incumbent Howard Lee, Jack Maultsby, John Fox and Douglas Holmes—will then be asked to answer the following question in a three-minute time limit: "How do you view the role of mayor in a community of Chapel Hill's diversity? Do you see its

nature to be administrative or innovative?"

The candidates for Town Board will be given three minutes to answer either of the following two questions: "How do you view the growing number of drive-in businesses in Chapel Hill and what kinds of planning procedures need to be implemented?" and "What do you think Chapel Hill's future should be? Should it be open to unlimited growth or should it remain a college town?"

Candidates for the Board of Aldermen are incumbents Mrs. Alice Welsh, Steve Bernholz, R.D. Smith and Joe Nassif, and James Wallace, Jim LaBrec and Jim Crisp.

Town bus fares lowered

New rates for the Chapel Hill-Carrboro bus system went into effect Monday. The fares have been lowered to 15 cents with a 10 cent transfer fee.

The issue had been raised in previous meetings of the commission, but was not acted on until Monday night.

"We felt we had to persuade people not to drive their cars and to take the bus," Bill Lieberman, a member of the commission, said Thursday.

Patronage of the buses has been far below expectations during the first few weeks of operation.

It was announced at an April 15 meeting of the commission that the buses were averaging only 300 passengers daily. The daily rate had originally been expected to be 1,000.

The new rate system will be experimental until action is taken on a May 4 referendum, which will decide whether or not the bus system will be supported by taxes.

The bus system is currently running on a subsidy from the towns of Chapel Hill and Carrboro. If the referendum is passed, the tax would support the system for the remainder of the year after current subsidies expire.

Town government moves to new center this week

Town government offices will be moved some time this week to Chapel Hill's new \$500,000 Municipal Center, which has been under construction for a year and a half.

The first floor of the modern three-story building will house the mayor's office, the assistant town manager's office, the town clerk's office and the purchasing department.

The Town Planning Department, the Public Works Department, the building inspector's office and the Civil Defense office will be on the second floor. The basement will contain the Recreation Department and a large meeting room.

The building is located behind the main fire station between Columbia Street, Airport Road and Stevens Street. Plans for the building were drawn by

Tom Bridges of City Planning and Architectural Associates, a Chapel Hill firm.

Two parking lots are provided, an upper-level lot with access from Columbia Street and a lower-level from Stevens Street.

Future plans include the construction of a separate Council Chambers building to provide meeting quarters for the Board of Aldermen. The addition will probably not be made for another four or five years. The board will continue to meet in the Town Hall courtroom for the present.

Most of the office space to be vacated in Town Hall will be taken over by the Police Department. The mayor's and town manager's offices will be remodeled to provide facilities for an additional day of District Court here.
