Drop-add resumes today; tuition due

Deadlines for tuition and fees payment, drop-add registration and pass-fail decisions are coming up in the next two weeks.

The end of drop-add registration is Wednesday, Sept. 8. Students can still go through drop-add by visiting individual departments and schools.

Tuition and fees must be paid by Friday, Sept. 10, at the cashier's office in Bynum Hall. Any student receiving a scholarship, loan or work-study grant who has not paid his fees should go by the Student Aid Office and check payment procedures.

Pass-fail registration decisions must be made by Friday, Sept. 17. Any course may be taken pass-fail except English I and 2, foreign language or mathematical science requirements, general college divisional electives, major courses and related courses specifically required by number in the major, and courses taken to validate credit for preceding courses.

A maximum of 24 semester hours of pass-fail credit may count toward graduation. There is no limit on the number of pass-fail hours taken in a given semester. Fifteen hours of letter-grade credit are required to qualify for entry on the Dean's List.

To select a course for pass-fail, the

student should obtain a form from the office of his dean. General College students must have a "election approved by their advisors before submitting it to 308 South Building. A separate form must be filled out for each course taken pass-fail.

No change in pass-fail election can be made after Sept. 17.

Hospital needs volunteer help

The YMCA is recruiting student volunteers for work at Murdoch Hospital for the Mentally Retarded.

Ann Haubenreiser, YMCA Murdoch Committee chairman, said volunteers are needed in many areas. Students can work in the hospital's unit for the blind, multi-handicapped, child management and training programs, the intensive training unit and the chaplain's department.

Murdoch Hospital treats retarded persons from pre-school to adult. Student volunteers can choose the age and degree of retardation of the patients they wish to work with.

Miss Haubenreiser worked with a

group of five patients, all in their early 20's, last year.

"Mainly we just talked with each other," she said. "Other volunteers worked with young children teaching 'social graces,' things as simple as tying their shoes."

Students interested in working at Murdoch Hospital should fill out an application available in the Y Building, room 102. An orientation program will be held later to explain details to interested students.

Murdoch Hospital is located in Butner, about 25 miles from Chapel Hill. Car pools will be formed to transport the student volunteers.

Refrigerators rented today

The Student Services Commission, which failed to rent out all their refrigerators last week, will attempt to rent the remaining 150 from 2-5 p.m. today.

Refrigerators will be available at the Student Union and Hinton James Dormitory, said Robert Grady, director of the commission.

Grady said many students now holding refrigerator permits do not have refrigerators. "These people can't hold the permits if they don't obtain refrigerators, either from us or some place else," he said.

Eye research given money

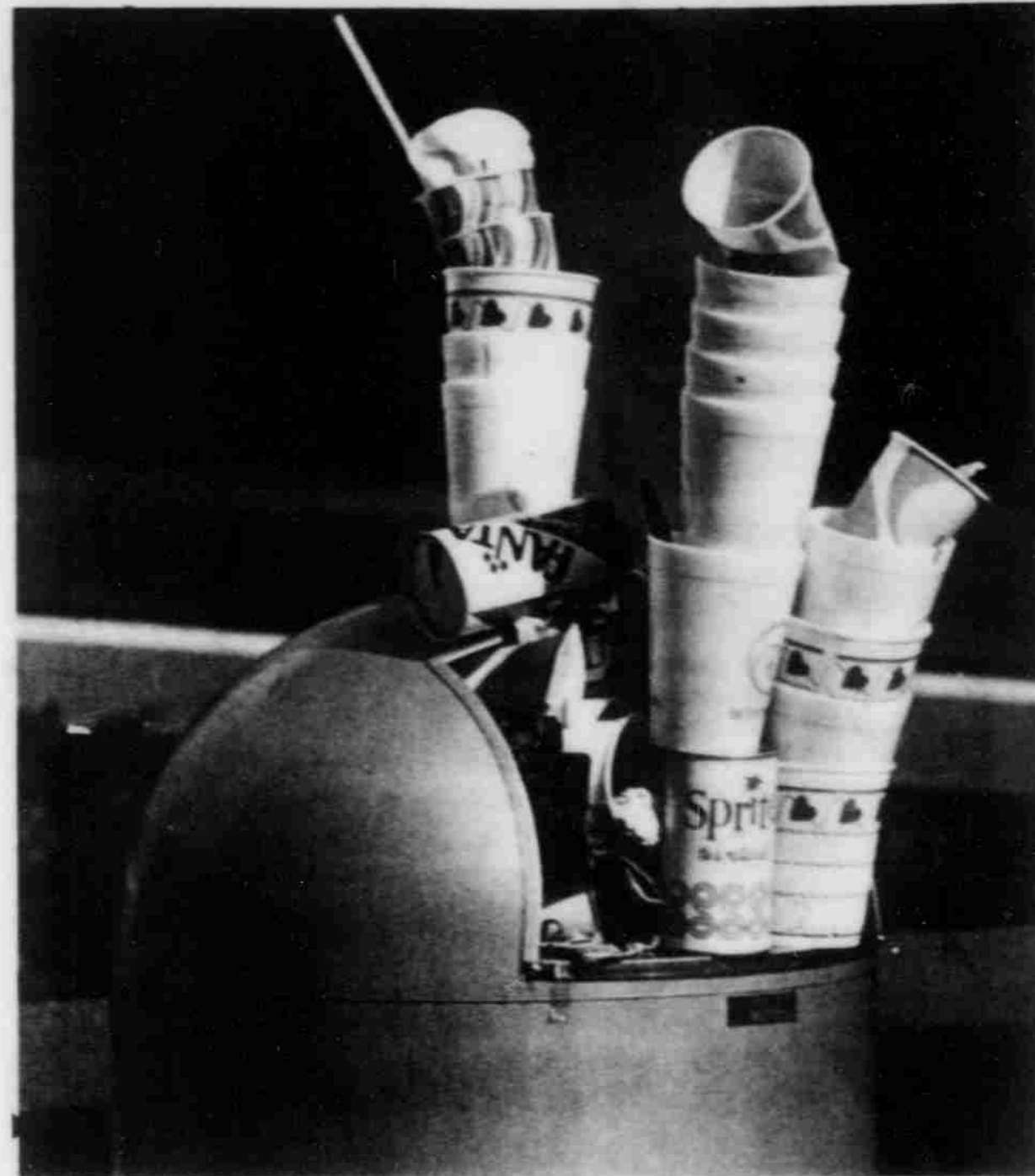
A \$23,000 grant for continued eye research has been awarded to the UNC Ophthalmic Laboratory.

The grant is another in a series from the N.C. Association for the Blind. Since its establishment in 1955, the association has contributed more than \$150,000 in grants from the association.

It is the only state facility specializing in eye research and pathology. It also analyzes eye tissue specimens for private eye specialists throughout the state.

Extensive research programs and development of innovative surgical and treatment techniques are other activities of the laboratory.

Contributions from local N.C. Lions Clubs are the main source of support for the association and the laboratory.
